

Why Disgraceful. (Peterboro' Review.)

The Newmarket Era among its editor-The Newmarket Era among its editorial notes has the following:

"The Peterboro' Review characterizes
the appointment of Samuel Stanley
Peck, Eq., by the Ontario Government,
to the position of stipendiary magistrate
for the provisional county of Haliburton,
as "disgraceful." The why and wherefore

is not stated." We may remark that we did not give the reasons for our statement because the facts are so well known in this vicinity, but we would be very loath to withold an explanation when called upon by a journal so fair, moderate and impartial as we have found the Newmarket Era to be.

The reason why the appointment of S. S. Peck to the bench is a disgraceful one is that his career has been such as to prove him atterly unworthy of such an honorable position. His fitting place in court is certainly not upon the bench. Having been appointed treasurer of the provis-ional county of Haliburton, S. S. Peck violated not only the rules of common honesty, but also the trust which had been reposed in him, by appropriating large sums of the county money and applying them to his own use. This is no doubtful report founded upon stolen and forged documents, as is the fashion of S.S. Peck's friends, but is the result arrived at and officially declared by Judge Dean, of the county of Victoria, a gentleman whose ability and impartiality no Reformer would care to dispute. It is a pity that 8. 8. Peck did not come before Judge Dean in his capacity as Judge, and not as

a master in chancery. To add to the meanness of this defaleation there is the fact that the county of Haliburton is a young, struggling and far from wealthy municipality, and that this embezzlement of its funds has added oppressively to the burden upon its settlers. Yet S. S. Peck, though he promised to do so, has made no effort to restore to these poor people the money with which they intrusted him, and which he so basely appropriated. He still has their dollars in his pocket, or more probably

invested in Dakota. But the Mowat Administration has not only disgraced itself by appointing such a man to the bench. They have made themselves in a measure accomplices in his misdeeds. S. S. Peck would undoubtedly have been made to disgorge, even if he had not received his proper punishment, but fer his impudent boasts that he had the ear of Mr. Mowat, that he had already secured for the county a large expenditure of public money and that he would obtain still more if he were left unmolested. And it is a shameful fact that this man, who had proved himself to be unfit to handle other people's money, was entrusted by the Mowat administration with large sums from the provincial treasury to expend in the county. They actually used the money of the people of Ontario, and placed it in such danger, with the double object of enabling this man to purchase immunity for himself and poli-

tical support for them. Though this man has for these reasons experienced a strange leniency in the past from the county authorities, and though he had been allowed to misrepresent them in the Local Legislature, at the recent election the electors revolted from re-incurring such disgrace and spurned him with richly deserved contempt. Yet this peculator whom the electors righteously deemed unworthy to represent them, and whom they dismissed at the risk of losing the corrupt grants he could secure, Mr. Mowat hastened to appoint as their stipendiary magistrate, because he had been subservient political supporter.

Fancy what a scandal it would be if S. 8. Peck were sentencing some poor settler for a theft of provisions, and his victim were to allege that he was driven to it by poverty, to which Peck, by appropriating his money, had largely contributed, and that he thought his judge had a better right to be in the dock than himself. He could hardly be punished for contempt of court, for it is a contempt in which every honest man must share.
