RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. All entries must be received by the Secretary before the day of show, and may be mailed to him, or left at the store of J. Keith, Kent st., Lindsay. Entries may be made till 12 o'clock noon on the day of the show, on payment of \$1 extra.

2. The horses to which prizes shall be awarded must stand in Lindsay once a week during the season.

3. Horses not entered in the proper class shall be ruled out, and no horse not entered will be allowed on the ground.

4. Pedigrees of horses must be produced to the satisfaction of the Judges and Secretary on Fair day. Prices will not be paid till October.

5. The horses must be on the ground by one o'clock p.m. on the day of show.

6. In no case will any of the preceding rules be departed from.

Teams will be admitted on the grounds free of charge on day of Fair.

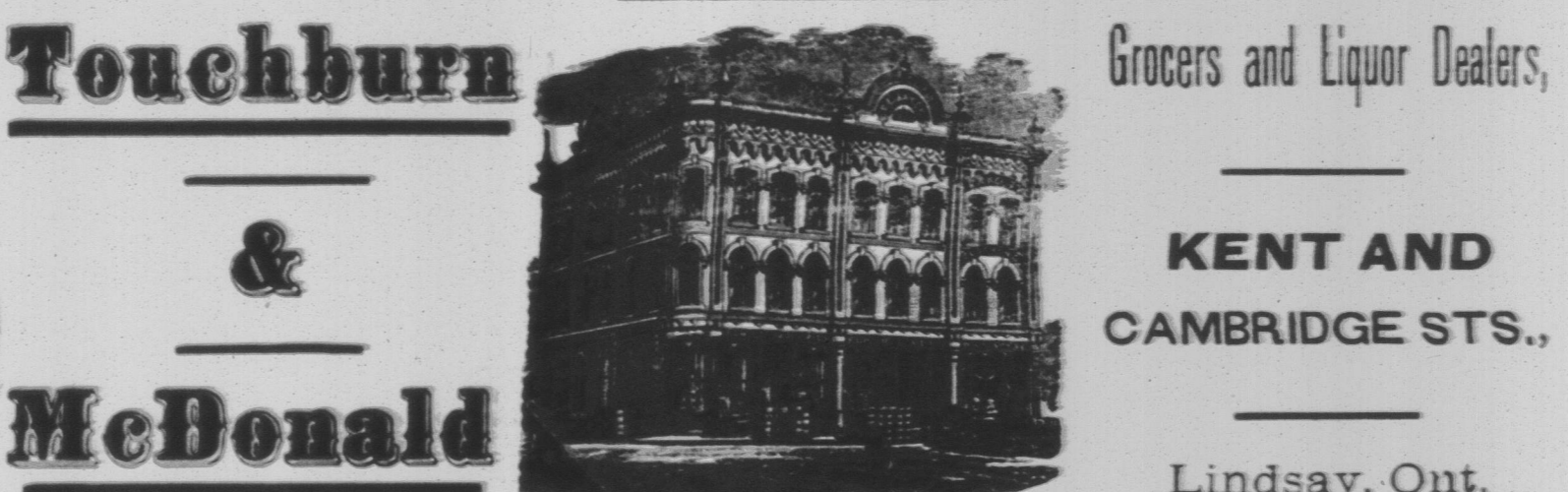

SEPARATE FEMALE SCHOOL.—We learn that a scheme to establish a separate girls school in connection with our common schools is almost matured and will be submitted to a meeting of those favorable to this object on Monday evening next. It would appear that a number of our citizens who contribute more or less to the school rates prefer sending their little girls elsewhere than to our common schools where they held their department, conduct and morals are not so strictly supervised, and they appear to support their views by something more than mere theories. That our school board and teachers have been somewhat remiss in this respect admits of no doubt in the face of recent revelations, and that a shaking of the dry bones may be productive of good is beyond question, but those interested in school reform wish to go further and in some way which they are prepared to explain wish to establish a female school totally removed and separate from male influences when the more opposition of gross indelicacies may be avoided, and they advocate such as those who may wish to patronize will bear the expense of constant female control assisted only in degrees from the public funds to which they contribute, and as such proportion as in any degree to increase the school tax, but do not purpose to interfere with the present system. We do not see any just reason why they should not be seconded by the parents and Board of Education. At any rate as the subject is very important to the community at large we are prepared to give it a fair consideration.
