FENELON FALLS.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—The annual meeting of the Fenelon Falls Mechanics' Institute was held in the reading room on Monday evening last, and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mr. E. THE PULP MILL.—Last week Messrs. Scott & Hall, two of the members of the firm, arrived here, accompanied by about half a dozen carpenters, and active operations have actually been commenced. The negotiations respecting the strip of land owned by Mr. R. C. Smith have not only terminated, but the property has been bought and paid for and the ownership transferred; and Mr. Geo. Gunningham's four acre lot near McArthur and Thompson's saw mill has been purchased for \$200, to be used as a milling ground.

The frame house built by Mr. Dewart on May street, and now owned by Mr. Jordan, has been rented for a boarding house, but it is not yet decided who is to "run" it. On the portion of the market square leased to the pulp mill company there are to be erected as soon as possible three dwellings for some of the employees; and already the necessary materials have been bought, and in a day or two the carpenters will be at work on the doors, windows, etc., in the old blacksmith shop on the Davis property on Francis street.—Gazette.

Clydesdale Stallion "ABBOTSFORD,"

No. 1565, Scotch Stud Book, foaled 6th June, 1879, bred by David Buchanan, Garscadden, near Kilmarnock, is a bright bay, with white face and three white feet, the property of MOSSON BOYD and GEORGE M'GUGG.

Sire, Ivanhoe, (386); Dam, Garscadden Maggie, (41), by General Williams, (326); Grand Dam, Lovely, (40), by Victor, (399); Traxion, (300), the sire of Abbotford, was the winner of the first prize at the Highland and Agricultural Society's Show at Dumfries, and also at the Glasgow Agricultural Society's Show in 1875, thus being champion of the world as an aged horse at five years old. Ivanhoe also won several other prizes. (See Clydesdale Stud Book, vol. I, page 72.)

CANADIAN MARQUIS, (41), the dam of Abbotford, gained first prize at the Highland and Agricultural Society's Show at Aberdeen in 1876, thus being champion as an aged mare at six years old, being champion at Aberdeen in 1876. (See Clydesdale Stud Book, vol. I, page 162.)

GENERAL WILLIAMS, (386), was a prize winner at the Highland Society's Show at Dumfries in 1870, and at Perth in 1871, and also gained the premium for Buteshire two seasons, and the premium for Rosshire in 1874. (See Clydesdale Stud Book, vol. I, page 58.)
