THE Port Perry Standard says:—Our respected townsman, J. B. Campbell, Esq., left here on Tuesday last, with his camp equipage, for an extended visit to the wilds of the north, having accepted the responsible position of surveying, locating and superintending the construction of a section of the Toronto and Nipissing Eastern extension Railway, running from a point on the Victoria near Kilmount, to Pine Lake. THE Dominion Bank makes a good statement this year (ended 30th April). They have added to their rest account \$100,000, after paying their shareholders 10 per cent, making that account \$50,000 or 5 per cent of their capital. It has now the largest reserve fund of any of the banks. We notice they have the confidence of the public, as their deposits are very large—some \$5,000,000, and their cash services also are large in proportion. This institution has worked its way up to its present position in a short time (about 10 years) and must have had skillful engineering.

ANOTHER GONE.—Tuesday afternoon another old resident of Lindsay, Mr. Wm. Bell, was laid to rest in the Riverside cemetery, followed by a large cortege of sorrowing friends. Mr. Bell at the time of his death was 75 years of age, nearly forty of which had been passed in and around Lindsay, and in many ways he had assisted in making the town what it is to-day. In politics he was Conservative and for many years was one of the leading Orangemen of the county. Both lodges here took part in the funeral ceremonies. His family, now all grown up and settled in life, have the sympathy of numerous friends in their bereavement.

He fully believed this would prove as prosperous.

OBITUARY.—Thursday evening Mrs. Fidler, the beloved wife of Dr. Fidler, Lindsay, departed this life after an illness of some weeks' duration. Mrs. Fidler was the third daughter of the late Morgan Jellet, of Cobourg. The deceased lady had for many years lived in Lindsay and was well known as a devout and consistent christian, a kind and considerate mother, and one who was always ready to assist the poor and needy. For about fourteen years she had been a teacher in St. Paul's Sunday school, and it is there next to the bereaved home her gentle face and kindly voice will be missed the most. The funeral took place on Saturday to St. Paul's church, thence to the Riverside cemetery, the church being crowded by friends to listen to the solemn burial service and to pay their last respects to the dead. The bereaved family and relations have the sympathy of many friends. The church was heavily draped and the memorial service, and on Sunday afternoon Rev. Mr. Jones took occasion to refer in feeling terms to the life and work of the noble lady so recently laid to rest.

On Tuesday evening of last week a large audience gathered in the Opera house to enjoy another of the popular temperance entertainments given by the friends of the Lindsay association for the prevention and suppression of intemperance. The programme was opened by a duet rendered in their wonted happy style by the Misses Gallon. Mr. Gallon followed by reading the "Field of Waterloo," after which Mrs. W. J. Hopwood delighted the audience with the favorite song "The Blue Alsatian Mountains." The Rev. Mr. Anderson then spoke for a few minutes upon the question of the evening temperance, at the close of which 38 gentlemen and ladies enrolled themselves as members of the association by signing the pledge. During the business intermission the resignation of the popular and energetic secretary was tendered by letter. Dr. Burrows proposed, and Mr. Smyth seconded, and it was carried unanimously, a vote of thanks to Mr. A. C. Steele for his entering zeal and kind and disinterested labors in inaugurating and carrying on the business and for so largely promoting the welfare of this association. The second part of the programme was then proceeded with and Mrs. Hopwood, the Misses Gallon and Miss Minnie Gallon again favored the audience with two songs and a duet. Mr. Dunn brought the proceedings to a close by reciting amidst breathless silence a very thrilling legend by Longfellow, in which the audience were shown that temperance should be carried into other fields as well as that of the use of intoxicating liquors. 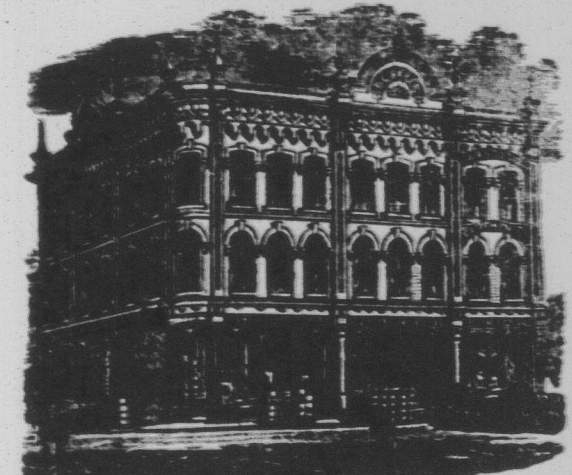
