The most terrible fire that ever visited Uxbridge commenced Saturday morning at about one o'clock in the market building. When first discovered it had made large headway and part of the roof had fallen in. From the market building the fire spread to the tower of the fire hall, and from there down to the lower part of the building where the water-works were, and in a few moment. the building where the water-works were, and in a few moments the fire hall was a mass of flames. The water-works stopped mass of flames. The water-works stopped working and the only source of water supply was the hand engine. The flames quickly spread to the Guardian printing office, immediately adjoining the fire hall, from there to Charles Nix's dwelling and harness shop, then to Thomas McGrattan's steve and tinware depot. It was thought that the fire could be stopped here on the north side of Brock street, but the brick buildings on the south side of the street, comprising the Mechanics' Institute, May's jewellery store, and Stickney's drug store were in great danger, the windows all breaking and the window cornices of Mr. Stickney's house catching fire several times. The fire by this time had got past the control of the firemen, and Bascom's large hotel, sheds and stables were on fire, and the Bascom house was soon a mass of flames. The present Marquis, Henry Charles Keith Fitzmaurice, succeeded his father in 1865, and is the fifth of his family who has held the present title, it having been created in 1874 by George III. He was born January 14, 1845, and is therefore now in his thirty-ninth year. Educated at Eton and Baliol college, Oxford, he graduated, and in 1863 commenced what bids fair for a brilliant career of public usefulness by being appointed a commissioner of the Exchequer of Great Britain and of the treasury of Ireland at the age of 23, which he held from 1868 to 1872. During Mr. Gladstone's first administration he was appointed Under Secretary of War in 1872, and held the office till the Government went out in February, 1874. On Mr. Gladstone's second advent to power in 1880 he was appointed Under Secretary of State for India, an office which he did not retain very long. He was some time captain of the Wilts yeomanry cavalry, and is a magistrate for Wiltshire. In 1869 he married Lady Maud Evelyn Hamilton, large and commodious. H. WARE, Proprietor. youngest daughter of the Duke of Abercorn, and has two sons and two daughters living. His eldest child is a daughter; his oldest son is Henry William Esmond, known as the Earl of Kerry, and is eleven years of age. The family is a very old one, the earliest creation dating back of 1811, when the then representative of it was created first Baron Kerry, next Baron Lixnan, Henry II, then reigning in England. In the peerage of Great Britian he is Baron Wycombe, of Chipping-Wycombe, Bucks (creation 1760) Earl of Wycombe and Viscount Calne and Calnestorn (1874), and Marquis of Lansdown in the county of Somerset. His family seats are Bowood Park, Calne, and Derreen, Kenmare, County Kerry, and his town residence, 54 Berkley square, Lendon W.
