A NEW time table for the Midland will be issued about the first of June. According to it a train will run from Port Hope at 8 a. m., connecting with a train from Peterboro' at 7 a. m., passing at Lindsay at 8 a. m., and reach Toronto via Manilla and Wick by 10.30.

THE Sons of England are talking of having a grand excursion to Washburn's Island on Dominion day, where it is proposed to meet two lodges from Port Perry. Arrangements are not completed as yet, but if the excursion takes place it will undoubtedly be well patronized unless greater inducements are offered in Lindsay.

THE dredge is at work again in the short cut down the river. The last appropriation of \$4,000 ought to open it out. It was used during the high water, and it was found that with a few, three quarters of an hour was saved. Over two miles are gained, but the turning and twisting in the two miles is of more consequence than the distance. The new cut needs widening about half way down, so that two boats could pass.

BUSINESS must be good with Messrs. Melville & Thornbury judging by the length of time the lamps are burning each night in the tailoring room. We are pleased to learn that this firm's business is increasing so rapidly, and the many suits they turn out each week meet with so much satisfaction. By some means or other various reports got around last week regarding one of our well known citizens, and which were not at all likely to increase the confidence the people had in his integrity. It is needless to say all the unkind rumors and surmises quickly ceased as soon as he was discovered to have just returned from his farm a few miles from Lindsay, and those who had talked so loudly about the alleged deficiency in the town taxes became as mute as possible.

NUMEROUS conjectures are already being made as to the best point to erect the new post-office, that is when we get the grant for it. Some appear to think some point on William street would be a good one, but the majority consider the spot on which the Episcopal church stands or the lot to the west of it, on which are the three old frame houses, would be the most centrally situated and most convenient to the trains, all of which will before long be coming in and going out from the Whitey depot. This would certainly be a good point, and no doubt if suitable arrangements were made the Episcopalians would be able to erect the new church in other and fully as convenient quarters. The trouble is now of course to get the grant, but when arrangements and plans are in progress for the erection of the new church it is no harm to mention the matter.

AMONG the many ups and downs of some dwellers on William street during the past few months the escapade of Monday afternoon was by far the worst that has yet taken place. During the day it appears John Hartwick, jr., had been drinking rather freely, as John does sometimes too frequently, and went into the Tremont house to have a fuss with the bartender. That young man, it seems, did not relish the overtures of Mr. Hartwick, especially when he took occasion to strike him over the head, and picking up a poker he "fetched" Hartwick over the head so decisively as to lay his forehead open. Not content with almost splitting his head open he drew a revolver and appeared bound to make an end of his assailant, and would in all probability had it not been for the interference of those standing by. The irate bartender was subsequently placed in the lock-up and Hartwick taken to a surgeon to have his head sewed up. He is in rather a delapidated condition.

Again, above the millinery room is the tailoring department where there are over a score tailors and tailoresses busy plying the needle and turning out the suits as fast as nimble fingers can do so. The City Store trade is a large one, but not more than the proprietors deserve, and we hope that it will steadily increase till they are compelled to occupy premises double the size of the large ones they now use.

THE weather on the lakes has been so extremely disagreeable that but little passenger traffic has yet been done by the boats. Business in freight is however reported good.

THURSDAY afternoon of last week a man named Daugherty was arrested for fighting and disorderly conduct on the public street by constable Smart. The man being a powerful fellow, and a sober gave him considerable trouble, which was much increased in the endeavor to make him go up the steps into the lock-up. He suddenly tumbled himself over, bringing constables Smart and Clunan along with him, while some individual gave Mr. Smart an ugly kick on the leg from behind while he was raising the prisoner. He cannot say who did it, as there was a large crowd round him. It was for a time very painful and gave him considerable trouble in moving about. A reward of \$10 will be paid by Mr. Smart to any one who can furnish information as to the individual who gave him so cowardly a kick.

DISPENSING WITH CASH BOYS.—A new cash system is being adopted in retail stores in the eastern cities and which dispenses with the services of cash boys. A miniature elevated railway is used, on which bells containing the cash and bill of goods purchased are carried from the cashier's office to different stations along the line. Two lines are used, both being inclined in opposite directions to make the balls travel as desired. The balls are of wood, and of different sizes, so that each ball into a basket provided for it at the station from which it is despatched. The transmission of the balls make no noise, and the confusion caused by the cash boys running about a store is avoided. These cash railway systems are manufactured by a Philadelphia company. They are not sold to those who use them, but rented for \$20 a station per annum. The number of stations required depends upon the size of the store which the system is used.

THE beautiful rain appears as though it will never hold up. Almost since the snow went off there has been steady rain till all the low lands are now more wet and unenjoyable than they were in the first place. It is now the 1st of June and all he done this year there is considerable low land to be sown yet, and for all the growth there has been so far it would have been nearly as well had even the high lands not been sown either. The farmers in Victoria will at all events have but a short time this season to till their farms and house their crops, and it is very possible from the wet and sour condition of much of their land the general crops and subsequently the profits from the farms will not be anything like as good as they were last year. The prospects at any rate do not look so at present, although we still hope for drier and more favorable weather.

THE steamer Eva intends in a few days to begin making double trips between Lindsay and Bobcaygeon, arriving at Lindsay from the latter port at 9:30 a. m. and returning at 10 and arriving in Lindsay again at 5 p. m., after which she returns to Bobcaygeon for the night. Of course Capt. McCallum does not know whether this will pay, especially considering the very peculiar weather of the present summer, but he will keep the boat on this extended route and at consequently greater expense so long as the Lindsay people will patronize him sufficiently to pay the increased cost of running. This, we believe they will do, for Lindsay people are as keenly alive to an enjoyable holiday as the Sturgeon Point summer hotel and the charms of boating and fishing on Sturgeon lake as any people can be found anywhere, so that when Capt. McCallum does his best to provide it for them at so small a loss of time as well as expense they will not be likely to leave him in the lurch, especially when his efforts are for their benefit alone.

PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY.—The Presbytery of Lindsay held its regular meeting at Woodville, on Tuesday, May 29th, Rev. A. Ross, moderator, when the following items of business among others were transacted.—A motion of sympathy was passed for Rev. J. T. Paul and A. G. McLaughlin in their protracted illness. A call from Quaker Hill was presented and sustained in favor of Rev. Mr. Bryant, of Guelph, and one from Knox church, Beaverton, for Rev. Mr. Patterson, of Summerstown, Glengarry Presbytery. It is expected that both gentlemen will accept and be inducted early in July. Mr. Myers, B. A., a graduate in arts of Toronto university, and in theology of Princeton seminary, New Jersey, applied to be taken on trial for license. After a preliminary examination, which was very satisfactory, the usual application on his behalf was ordered to be made to the General Assembly, which meets in London on the 19th inst. The Rev. Joseph Elliot, pastor for the last four years of Knox church, Cannington, demitted his charge, and asked for leave to retire from the active ministry on account of his advanced age. The Presbytery agreed to his request with great reluctance, sorry to lose his valuable services, and his pastorate at Cannington terminates on 30th June, and Mr. Elliot and family move to Toronto to live. The following minute regarding him was submitted and adopted:—"On receiving and accepting the resignation of the Rev. Jos. Elliot, of the pastorate of Knox church, Cannington, after a ministry of four years, the Presbytery would, and hereby do, place on record their very deep regret that they must now lose the presence and services of their valuable co-Presbyter. They would assure Mr. Elliot of their high appreciation of his many social and ministerial qualities, his urbanity and bonhomie, his matured experience and sound judgment, his broad mental culture and unobtrusive yet pervasive piety—in a word, those varied gifts and graces which constitute an able minister of the New Testament, of which he has given ample proof during a ministry of 40 years. In commending their brother to the love and protection of the Divine Master, they would also commend his wife and family to the same gracious keeping, and would pray that he may be spared yet many days to serve Christ and the church in other fields of usefulness. And further, the Presbytery would pray that his late congregation, soon to be vacated may speedily secure another pastor, and may meantime be suitably supplied with the means of grace."

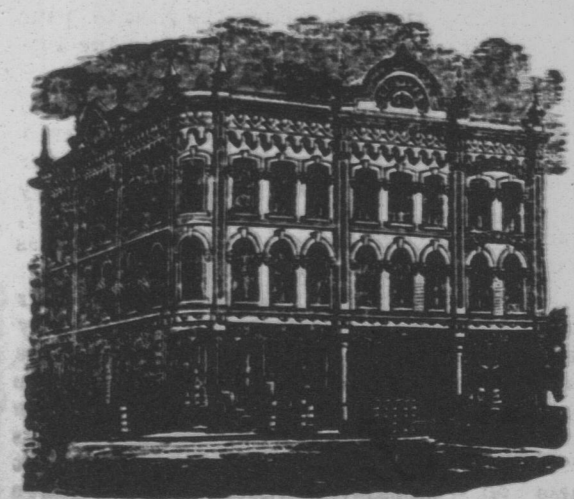
