The Lindsay Water Works.

[To the Editor of the Warder.] SIR,-I think it is quite time some active measures were adopted to make our water works more effective.

We have beyond question a good system for efficient fire protection. The good service rendered on some occasions settles this, but it is also true, for some reason, on many occasions it has been found faulty.

To ascertain the cause and apply the remedy should be the earnest wish of every ratepayer, for were it generally known to the managers of the insurance companies writing risks in Lindsay that we have been since last winter, and are to-day, at the mercy of an accident. I fear the rate of premium would be greatly increased or the insurance of our property withdrawn altogether.

I am of the opinion that most of the inefficiency is because the power employed is not under our own control. A divided authority seldom proves, satisfactory, and this is no exception to the rule, and I fear while the care of our pumps and apparatus is under one management and the power to work the same is under another, we shall always be liable to trouble, annoyance and disappointment.

To me it seems the time has arrived when we should take the whole management into our own hands, supply the necessary premises and power, and place a responsible man in charge of all, whose business it would be to daily test its efficiency, supply everything required, and be responsible under all circumstances. This will of course require a considerable expenditure at the outset, but we would feel we had secured beyond question security under all circumstances.

To provide a water lot, erect a suitable building, procure an engine of sufficient power and apply our present apparatus should not cost over \$5,000 or \$6,000—or an expenditure on capital account, while the expense of maintainance would not be which could be made a direct source of revenue and go a good way in paying in-

terest on the investment. Under all the circumstances I think Messrs. Needler & Saddler would not object to be relieved of their contract with the town to supply the power, and this would make the way clear to at once enter on the scheme.
