A LARGE number of the Lindsay citizens went out to the Downeyville picnic on Tuesday, the day for once being fine.

The Health Bulletin for June 2nd, notes more equable weather, with a greater amount of sunshine. In no district has the thermometer descended to freezing. Bronchitis, anæmia and neuralgia are the prevalent diseases. Diseases has declined slightly, but fever and ague has increased. 19 diseases are specified.

A COMPARISON.—At last Lindsay recovers in the possession of a brass band! This is what Lindsay has yearned for for many a long day. But even the glory of owning a band does not seem to cause the citizens to "come down with the dust" sufficiently to place the musicians in a proper financial position. The WARDER asks, "could not the council give the band boys a small grant, say \$100 or so under proper conditions, and set them on their feet?" The Peterborough council, who have the reputation of not being endowed with more than the ordinary amount of liberality, recently gave their band \$200 for new instruments, purchased clothing, and contributed \$150 per annum besides—and we believe it is money well spent. We would suggest that in case the Lindsay council have not so much money on hand, the J. L. F. be asked to come down with the needed.—(Peterborough Times).

ANOTHER "FAT TAKE."—Last Wednesday Mr. Randolph McDonald, who is superintending the canal works here, received a telegram from his father, Mr. A. F. McDonald, at Ottawa, conveying the agreeable intelligence that the firm of which he is a member had secured the contract for the Tay canal, which is to run from a point on the river Tay near Perth to Ashbridge Bay, a distance of about seven miles. Manning & McDonald's contract in this village is not to be despised, as it will amount to not much less than \$200,000. The Tay canal, on which three locks are to be built, will cost from half a million to three-quarters of a million of dollars, and is likely to prove what printers would call a "fat take." Tenders for it were advertised for a long while ago, and opened last March, when Messrs. Manning & McDonald's proved to be the lowest; but the Government had not then decided whether to proceed with the undertaking or not. However, a decision in the affirmative has at length been arrived at, and Mr. A. F. McDonald is probably already at Perth making preparations for the profitable undertaking.—Gazette.

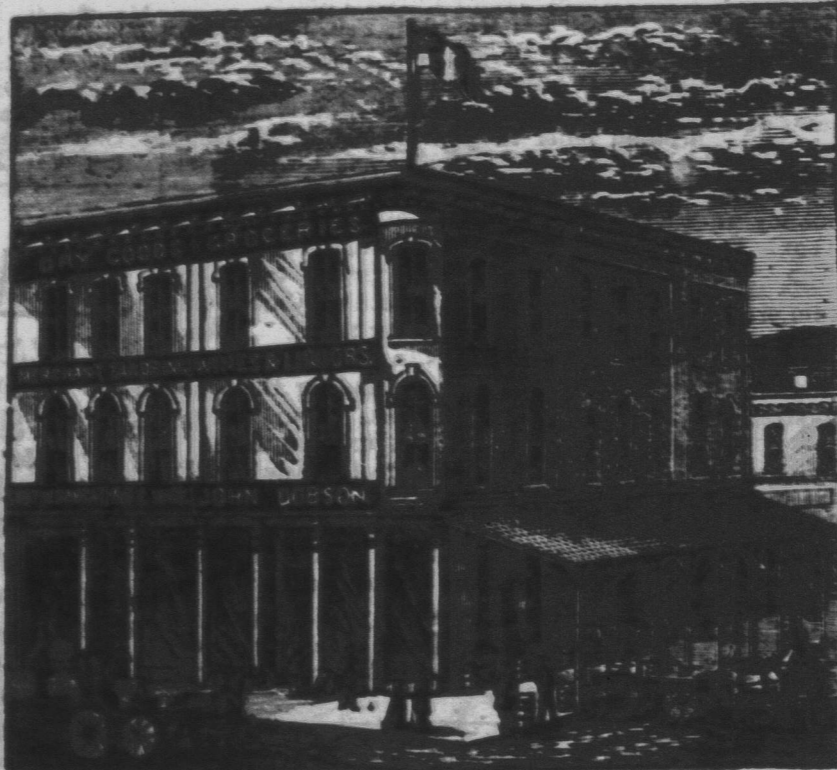
