#### The Lindsay Schools. [To the Editor of the Warder.]

SIR, -In the communications which I have so far submitted upon the school question I have been guided by the general principal that it is the first duty of games of all kinds. the Board of Education to provide the community with the means of acquiring a thorough English and commercial educais too well known to require any illustration. The auditors' report of the expenditure for the high and public schools is also before the board and the public. The tended. figures of that report are wood a which cannot lie, and they unfortunately force the conclusion that the Lindsay Board of Education have from some cause or other drifted into an absurd position by their extravagant expenditure for the high school at the expense of the public schools. In view of the important interests at stake, the heavy taxation with which the town is burdened, and the unfulfilled promises of the board this matter is not only serious, but the course of the

board has been highly culpable. From the last monthly report of the public schools the number of pupils upon the roll if 709. It is a fact well known that the school accommodations provided so far as room alone is concerned is scarcely sufficient for 650; and it is a fact equally well known that such accommodation in the case of several of the departments is simply a disgrace. An attendance of 709 under 14 teachers show an average of over 50 per teacher. The best authorities upon educational matters claim that an average of from 35 to 40 pupils is all that can be successfully instructed by one teacher. The 14 departments of the public school require constant supervising, but owing to the staff being insufficient the time of the headmaster is almost wholly occupied in teaching the division immediately under his control. Increased public school accommodation and the addition of at least one male teacher to the staff forces itself upon soon. Some talk of Mr. E. Mark selling sands of dollars. Are the ratepayers of the town prepared to support any longer the policy of the board, which in face of the impoverished state of the public Corresponder school supplies the Lindsay high school with 4 specialists for 86 of an attendance, and at an average salary of \$825! The amount of money which the board have amount of money which the board have for the past 3½ years unnecessarily squandered upon the latter institution would have supplied the public schools with sufficient building accommodation and teaching staff to bring them to that standard of efficiency which in the interests of the public they ought to possess. These specialists ought surely to be able to successfully manage the 36 pupils of the high cessfully manage the 86 pupils of the high school. But a total separation of the high school and public schools and the establishment of a 5th form in the latter institution, would so lessen the attendance at the high school that an experienced headmaster of good general scholar-ship with one assistant would be amply sufficient. By this means the training for an English and commercial education would be kept entirely distinct from that of a professional and higher character. The advantages financially are quite apparent, and the danger attending the parent, and the danger attending the union of higher and common education would be removed. This matter is too important to the future welfare of the people of the community to allow a settlement of the question to be any longer delayed. If there is a high school from one end of the Province of Ontario to the other which b-day should be a model educational institution in every respect it is the Lindsa high school. Under the present mangement it has failed to reach a higher stadard than 3rd class. The reasons of that failure I pointed out too clearly in milast communication to require repetiton. My statements in this connection se true to the letter. The objectionable features which I have pointed out in connection with the management of thatinstitution are also within the knowledge of the members of the Board of Education. How long considerations of a personal nature will be allowerations of apersonal nature will be allowed to weath against dearest interests of the peope of this community remains to be seen. The confidence which the rate-payers of the town have so far expressed in preser members of the board can be retained only by a complete change of policy on the part of that body in connection with ounchool system from beginning to
