THE 12th of July is to be duly celebrated this year in Midland City, and the Orangemen of this district are making active preparations for their excursion there on that day, leaving here in the morning and returning in the evening. The train starts from Bethany. This will give all desirous of seeing Midland a good opportunity to do so without losing much time.

THE gas men should be careful when laying pipes under the streets. A few days ago a team with a load of bricks came to a "soft spot" on William street opposite Dr. Poole's residence and considerable trouble was experienced through one of the wheels sinking in the mud. The wagon had to be unloaded before the team could draw it out and some slight damage was sustained to the harness before matters were finally righted.
ALL the trains now enter Lindsay by the Whitty depot, the old Midland station having been abandoned except for freight. When Messrs. McNelly & Walters get the bridge over the river completed and the branch built all passengers and Toronto freight will go by it, but until then they go up to the junction and then down the Victoria to the Whitty. We already begin to hear complaints of too fast time being made on Victoria avenue, some stating that the passenger trains passing along it at the rate of at least fifteen miles an hour. According to law and established usage no train can pass through a thoroughfare of a town faster than the rate of six miles an hour, and the engine driver who does leave himself liable to be summoned up.

THE excursion to Fenelon Falls and Sturgeon Point on Monday by the Sons of England was largely attended and a very enjoyable day was spent visiting friends at the Falls and the chief points of interest in that enterprising village. Financially it was also a success.
THE Lindsay True Blue Lodge No. 38 intend celebrating the 12th this year at Port Hope, where a large number of other lodges also participate. There has been a slight change in the regalia this year, which will make considerable improvement in their already neat appearance.
SOME one stole a portion of the fireworks on Monday, at all events so says Commodore Rodden. Some six rockets are missing and about a dozen roman candles. Who is the guilty party and what in the world did he steal them for? Mr. Rodden is bound to follow up the clue. Did the secretary miss any or did he not touch the fireworks business at all?

OBSTREPEROUS.—An individual on Saturday night made himself unduly lively on Kent street, and as soon as Constable Smart took charge of him acted in a very much as a wild man. He would neither go or stay, but kicked and scratched each and every one within his reach. Soon a large crowd was attracted in the midst of which he was dragged to the lock-up. During the scuffle and kicking on the part of the prisoner Constable Smart got rather badly used up about the hands and face.

THE RIVER.—Beginning last Monday morning a shuffle was made of routes of the steamers plying on the Sengog and Sturgeon lake. Capt. McCallum, with his steamer Eva, has changed from Bobcaygeon and Lindsay to Bobcaygeon and Bridgford, the nearest point to Peterboro', while Mr. Boyd's steamer Beauboocay takes the route between Lindsay and Bobcaygeon. The Victoria will ply between the Falls and Lindsay during the season. Lake accommodation will therefore be considerably better than heretofore, and as the Sturgeon Point hotel is to be refitted and improved at once the passenger traffic will be sure to be much increased. It is also said that Mr. Boyd intends next winter building a large, new boat specially for the trade between Lindsay and Bobcaygeon.

ANOTHER VICTORY.—In the baseball match between Lindsay and Cobourg on Monday last the former defeated the latter with ease, beating by 27, with one inning to spare. The Cobourg boys played well at the beginning, but once the Lindsays "got properly at them" their play weakened and the home club were masters of the game until the finish. The Lindsays have contested only two games this season and won both, which makes a remarkably good beginning. We hope the club will continue their present success. The Cobourg team were escorted to the station on their departure by the band and members of the Lindsay club, and spoke highly of the hospitality of the Lindsayites. The following is the score:—

THE Wick branch being now completed trains began running over it Wednesday and the new time card came into effect. Trains now on this division run between Toronto and Port Hope. The time for leaving Toronto for this district is 7 a. m. and 4:15 p. m., or three-quarters of an hour earlier than formerly, while the time from Lindsay is 8 a. m. and 5:15 p. m. This gives slightly less time in Toronto for those desiring to get through business in the one day and return, but otherwise is as satisfactory as before. There are complaints, however, that the T. & N. division and the part of the Midland from Lindsay to Lorneville junction will be very indifferently served with passenger accommodation, at all events till the road north has been widened. If so this will be most unjust to Lindsay business men, and will cause some annoyance to the people wishing to trade in Lindsay.

LAGOS TROUBLE.—The Review says the Italian navy on the "Mising Link" of the Midland Railway have for some days been grumbling about not receiving higher wages and threatening to force the payment of higher wages by a strike. This they resolved to do on Monday, and on that morning a number employed near Omamee refused to go to work. They did not, however, feel satisfied with refusing to work themselves, but they attempted to prevent the other men from working. This led to a disturbance, and the foreman took steps to secure the safety of the men who were willing to work. There are various reports as to how revolvers came to be used in the affray. One is that an Italian first drew a revolver and pointed it at the head of a foreman, and for a moment, in the language of one who was telling it, "his life was not worth a cent." Others observed the action of the Italian, and immediately two or three pistols were pointed towards him. One of them was fired, the ball entering his wrist. This it is said started the firing, and several shots were fired on both sides. Three Italians received bullet wounds, the one before mentioned in the writ, another in the cheek and a third in the hip. No one except Italians was injured by the firing, so far as we have been able to learn. The revolvers soon quieted the riotous sons of Italy, and one of them, the one who is said to have first drawn a revolver, was taken to Omamee, where an official investigation was commenced and adjourned.

In speaking of Mr. Geo. Matthews' pork packing establishment at Peterboro' the Review says:—"The capacity of the establishment is increased by the erection of a slaughterhouse, 30x13 feet. A new 12-h. p. boiler will be placed in the engine room. The refrigerator is the most important and expensive part of the new appliances, making a space of about 37x52 feet to be devoted to refrigerator purposes. The refrigerator proper, which is 25x16 feet in area, is placed within this space. The enclosing walls of the refrigerator proper will be of three-ply felt and wood. The ceiling of this room, which is Malcolm's patent, is composed largely of iron, supplied by Bryce Bros., Toronto, is nine feet from the floor. The ice space which reaches from the upper surface of the refrigerator ceiling to the roof of the building has a cubic content of 4,600 feet, and is capable of holding eighty tons of ice. Refrigerator proper will hold from 70 to 80 hogs at a time. The cellar is 44x36 feet and floored with brick on edge, laid in Portland cement, is directly beneath the cold chamber, and of course its temperature is also kept at a very low degree. The refrigerator is being put in by Mr. Malcolm, the patentee, and it, as well as the slaughter sheds, will be completed and killing will be begun in about a month. That is, the hogs will be slaughtered if the state of the pork trade and market suggest the advisability of so doing. The cost of the refrigerator and other additions to the facilities will be about \$4,500. These will make it a complete establishment in every particular. Hogs will be killed only in the summer season. In the winter the supply from the farmers and other sources will furnish a sufficient stock to keep the packing and curing part of the business furnished with material.
