THE Twelfth was duly celebrated by an excursion to Midland City yesterday. Several of the neighboring lodges of Orange-emen went. The young True Blues, however, went to Fort Hope to take part in the celebration there and a pleasant day was spent. In Lindsay there was no formal celebration during the day.

GARDEN PARTY.—A garden party and strawberry festival under the auspices of the Ladies Aid Society of the Methodist church will be given at the residence of Stas Bigelow, Esq., this (Friday) evening, commencing at six o'clock. An excellent programme of amusements and Harris' quadrille band will be in attendance. In case of rain it will be held in the basement of the Methodist church.

In reference to the matter in which the late Patrick Connor was killed last week, the Port Hope Guide has been informed that the engine driver, Hamlin, did not start his engine, but that a freight train, which was lying at the station, slackened up for the purpose of starting and ran into the locomotive. Hamlin, it says, did all that was possible to stop the engine, but without avail, and the throttle was not open.

THE LATE JOSEPH GOULAIS.—We regret to hear of the death of Mr. Joseph Goulais, the genial and well known proprietor of the Rockland house, Boboygon, which occurred on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Goulais has resided in Boboygon and been proprietor of an hotel there for years, and last year he erected the fine Rockland house. He was not only well known but universally respected.

No one can leave Lorneville or Woodville or any point on the Nipissing branch now without coming to Wick first and then north to Lindsay and then they cannot by any possibility return home the same day, if they live any distance up. It practically shuts off all our northern trade in the townships on the Nipissing line and as far west as Beaverton, inasmuch as it is impossible to come and return in anything like decent time.

They evidently expected to be badly beaten, and now that such a fortunate accident has overtaken them in success by reason of good swearing they scarcely know how to contain themselves. But they should not get too "fy" even in these fortunate circumstances, for the truth is beginning to work out although too late. KILLED.—Friday morning Patrick Connor, a young man of Peterboro met with a terrible death at Lorneville Junction. He was firing on the Midland railway engine No. 24. He had gone underneath the engine to clean out the ash pan, when the driver, receiving a signal from the conductor, opened the throttle. The locomotive moved and poor Connor was crushed under the low heavy ash pan, and of course killed instantly. Deceased was a steady, sober young man and the only support of a widowed mother.

A DETERMINED CASE OF SUICIDE.—On the Midland train which left the Union station, Toronto, Friday, was a gentleman named Mr. Alf. Bunker. He proceeded as far as Scarboro junction, where he alighted, and then walked along the G. T. R. track eastward for about a mile. When the local train, which left the junction at six o'clock, was proceeding in the same direction, the engineer noticed the man ahead staggering about in a strange manner. He rang the bell as a warning, and the engine had approached within three feet of Bunker when the latter threw himself under the wheels, which passed over him near the hips. The train was immediately stopped and the poor fellow picked up. He was found to be bleeding from a severe razor cut in the throat, evidently showing that the attempt at suicide was a most determined one. A doctor from Oshawa who was on board the cars did everything that could possibly be done to alleviate his sufferings, but without success, as the man died shortly after the tragic occurrence. He was apparently about 32 years of age, and was a traveller in the employ of a nickel-plate manufactory at Hamilton. No reason is assigned for making away with himself. This is the same young man who met with the accident at the Benson House here, and it was only a day or two before his death that he left Lindsay.

LOTS OF FUN.—After the "glorification" on Kent street and at Daly's hotel on Wednesday evening a large number of the active supporters of Mr. McIntyre in the protest business thought it a fitting occasion to have a dance. Accordingly Bell's hall was secured, and soon between eight and ten o'clock the Melchys and the O'Learys and the Flaharty's and others were dancing with an enthusiasm that was in great danger of literally "bringing down the house." It being "stag" dance and no fair partners with them apparently added much to the enthusiasm. All went beautifully, however, till the fiddler, Peter O'Connell, got indignant at something one of the dancers shouted at him, and in a second the fiddle was dropped and he was alongside of that saucy young man like a flash. The dance was immediately postponed, fair play was called, and everything was progressing for the best till the appearance of a constable that ever took place on William street when the stalwart form of Constable Smart was seen looming up. One word only did that warlike crowd whisper and that was "Smart," and the "Melchys and the O'Learys and the Flaharty's" and the combatants disappeared down the stairs like straw out of a threshing machine. In less than one minute and a half Constable Smart was quietly looking the door, while sixty or seventy noble dancers were standing on the sidewalk, and begging the "Melchys and the O'Learys and the Flaharty's" with trembling tongue and the most sacred names "never to give the thing away, boys."

Burke, for many years a resident of Lindsay and a well known engineer, has removed to Ontario with his family, where he will be engineer in charge of the Erie & Ontario R.R. The Independent says it is understood that the Bishop of Toronto has been pleased to appoint the Rev. Mr. Furness to the incumbency of Boboygon, and that the new incumbent will give service in Christ church and at Dunstons on Sunday the 22nd. The hour for the service will be announced in due time. The reverend gentleman is highly spoken of. Mr. E. K. 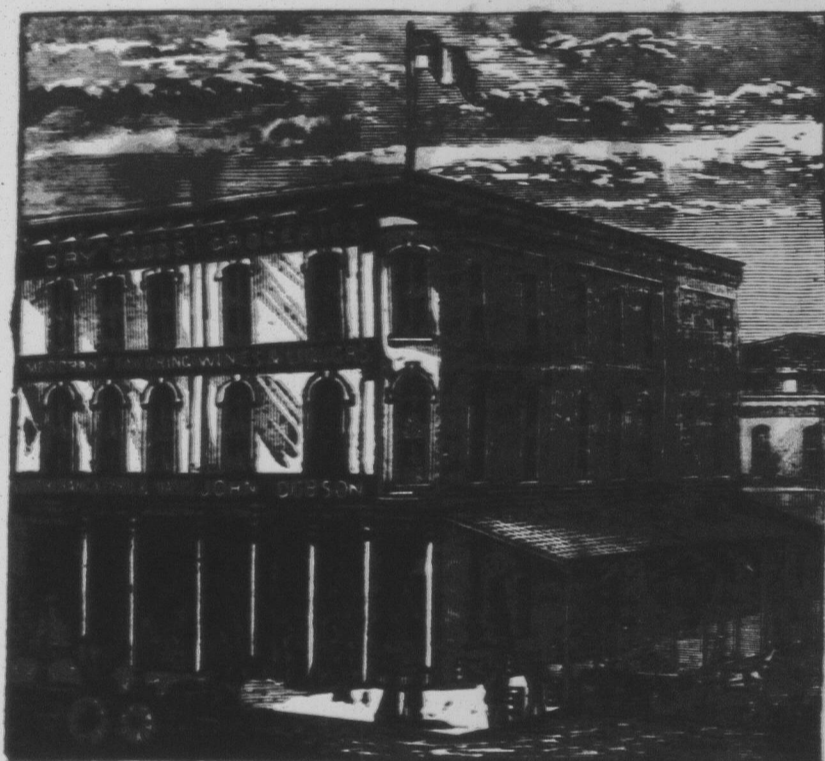
