The contract price for the new block, which is being erected by Mr. Edward Haw, is \$2,000. Mr. Joseph Mc-Arthur, our enterprise reeve, who is said by all his tenants to be a model landlord, is spending a little fortune on improvements on his hotel property. Not long ago he built a large addition to his stores; then he added a billiard room to the Mc-Arthur house; and now he is not only outting up a stone stable, 40x100 feet and 16 feet high, but is inclosing over half an acre behind the hotel with a stone wall two feet thick and eight feet high, and, when that is finished, will put up new sheds in place of the old ones and cover the most used portion of the yard with a thick layer of broken stone. #### Why This Anxiety!

Why is it that the Ontario Government are so anxious at the present time to gain possession of the disputed territory? The matter has been before the country for years and there have been repeated opportunities offered them to decide the question, but Mr. Mowat and his colleagues desiring to maintain it as a cry in the local elections, have studiously avoided any attempt at settlement. Why then this sudden outburst of anxiety ?

One has not to go far to find the answer. The Algoma election is near at hand, and on the result of it hangs the fate, in a great degree, of the Mowat Government. The constituency they are determined to hold by all means within their power, and one of the dodges which are now being used to gain that end is renewed activity to obtain possession of the disputed territory. The people of Port Arthur and Rat Portage and the intervening territory are at present being daily astonished by the exhibitions of paternal care which the Mowat Government effects for that district. In that portion of the country which has received little in return for the taxes paid the Ontario Government for years past, the expenditure of even a small amount of money on local improvements by Mr. Mowat is a novelty. It is only to be observed at election times and as the day is now fast approaching the expenditure grows larger.

#### News of the Week.

A little girl three yearsold encountering a poisonous adder in Fryeburg, Me., the other day, seized the snake and carried it alive to the house, where her stepmother killed it, though the woman was so frightened that she nearly fainted, and was ill for two days aferward. Track-laying on the Ontario & Quebec Railway is progressing slowly but steadily. About two miles of track have been laid east of Carlton, while fifteen miles have been laid west from Perth. The company are not pushing the work rapidly as they are not anxious to use the line until it is thoroughly ballasted, Construction trains will be run over the whole line late in the fall, but the road will not be opened for regular traffic until next year. The masonry of the bridge at Agincourt has been completed but the iron work will not be placed until it is needed.

As is generally known, the Bethlehem Iron Company purchased from Mr. Wm. Coe his lease of the Wallbridge hematite mine for \$30,000. They worked the mine for two years and abandoned it, in the belief that it was exhausted. Mr. Coe repurchased the lease, pumped out the water, and has now struck, at a greater depth in the same working, a new body of ore. This shows that the Bethlehem Company had struck what is termed a "horse," and rashly came to a wrong conclusion. If the mine is in reality a pocket it is much deeper than was supposed; but the probability is that the deposit is a permanent one and practically inexhaust-
