LINDSAY V. PETERBORO.-The match Lindsay v. Peterboro' was played at Lindsay on Thursday, resulting in a victory for Lindsay by 81 runs.

The wicket was in fair order and run-getting was fast and lively. The first innings of Lindsay closed for 92, of which Mr. Boyd contributed 23, but with four lives, Messrs. Smith 15, Benjamin and Grace W. 12 each. Peterboro', in their first innings got 82, of which Harley got 23 and R. Rogers 19. In the second innings Lindsay got 72 and Peterboro' 51. R. Rogers, for Peterboro', carrying out his bat for 20. The game was evenly matched and exciting, as was shown by the interest taken by the numerous spectators.

Mr. Workman, who plays for Peterboro', they being short, got 15 by determined hitting of each successive ball.

A GENTLEMAN in Orillia, formerly a resident of Lindsay, says the backward hamlet was within his recollection much more uncivilized than it is now. He remembers when a prominent citizen used to amuse himself by sitting in his doorway and shooting at his neighbour's pigs as they roamed about the streets.-Packet.

That gentleman, however, because they do such things in Orillia now must not think the same is done in Lindsay.

Whatever he may be in the habit of doing with his little gun in Orillia he must remember Lindsay has advanced considerably more than the people have there and such sports belong so far back to the "long time ago" that no one would ever think of them till they endeavored to live a month in that uncivilized and antediluvian apology for a village.

OBITUARY.-We regret to hear of the death of Mr. Mossom Boyd, of Bobcaygeon, one of the heaviest lumberers of Ontario. Mr. Boyd came into this part of the country many years ago and gradually worked up till for several years he has controlled and managed an immense lumber business giving employment to many hundreds. He in fact may be said to have built Bobcaygeon and has always watched over its interests like a father over a son. He was besides, a great admirer of fine cattle and horses and did much to improve the live stock in this county. If we are not mistaken Mr. Boyd was the only lumberman on the Trent waters who for a period of over a quarter of a century managed to steer his raft successfully through all the breakers which have beset the lumberman's career during that period and to leave a handsome competence for his family. As a business man Mr. Boyd was enterprising and ever ready to seize a favorable opportunity for extending his operations and as a consequence did much to promote the early settlement and prosperity of this district, as will no doubt continue to be the case in the hands of those to whom his business will fall. Mr. Boyd was an earnest advocate of the Trent Valley canal, and some years ago obtained a charter for its construction, and would have no doubt carried the project to a successful issue had it not been for the general financial depression which ensued. He was a Conservative in politics, and on one occasion unsuccessfully contested the county of Victoria. The large business will be carried on as usual by his sons, who have for some time taken the active management of affairs. The funeral takes place at Peterboro' this (Friday) afternoon at 4 p. m. and a large number of Lindsay business men and acquaintances will leave on the train to attend it.

CRICKET.-The match that was to have been played here yesterday between Uxbridge and Lindsay has been put off. On Tuesday next our club meets East Toronto on the school grounds and it is to be hoped our men will give a good account of themselves. A propos of cricket we clip the following concerning Messrs. C. J. Logan and M. Boyd, of the Lindsay club, from the sporting columns of the Mail: C. J. Logan.-This gentleman's strongest point is without doubt his bowling, which has been so strongly commended by the English professionals, who visited here some seasons back under Duff's captaincy.

"His bowling," they said, "has but one fault, and that is he bowls too well." Since that time Logan has had more experience, and he has profited greatly by it. Now he uses his head, and by the exercise of judgment he can reach a batsman's wicket which was before impregnable to the attacks of steady bowling. His accuracy is still unimpaired, and there can be no doubt that his right-handed, medium-paced deliveries are most dangerous to a batsman, especially where the bowler is backed up by a good fielding team. Logan is a fair field, but the less said about his batting the better, though at times he has got runs when they were most needed. Mr. M. Boyd, represent'd Canada last season, though his form hardly warranted his selection. This season his play has been very even, and he has come quite up to the English school standard, from which point Duff wrote his high praises of him in 1881. He plays with a good straight bat, well forward and back; is a good run-getter, hitting well along the ground. He bowls with variable speed and pitch, with an occasional break-back, and is in consequence rather a puzzling bowler to play. He is a very fair field, and though not fast, is reliable.

THE telegraph operators at Lindsay, as well as all over the country, struck last week for an increase of salary. Mr. Burton for a time took up the wires and now the agent is working alone. During the week a few messages have been got through but business is about at a standstill. As a consequence the mails are largely increased, the main trouble being obtaining market reports, stocks, etc.

THE gas works are operating satisfactorily and we believe all using the gas are well pleased thereby. It gives a good, strong light and is much superior in many respects to the ordinary coal gas. We understand our contemporary the Post has recently imported a new gas engine and will run by gas instead of steam, but we have not heard of any others who contemplate using it for machine purposes.

Chair to be taken at 7:30 o'clock. A collection will be taken up in aid of the lecture fund of the grand division. Mr. McMurray will occupy the pulpit of the Methodist church next Sabbath morning and the Bible Christian church in the evening.

A MEETING of the Ops Agricultural Society was held at Keith's store on the 21st July, 1883. Minutes read and approved. Members present: J. V. Reid, president; Jas. Farrell, P. Fisher, F. Curtis, Geo. McHugh and A. Robinson. Absent: H. Littlejohn, R. H. Gibb, A. Petrie, Alex. Simons and T. Ward. Moved by Jas. Farrell, seconded by P. Fisher, that the sum of \$50 be granted to the county society as a guarantee to assist to get up a central fair at Lindsay, provided the rest of the sister societies, namely, Mariposa, Emily and Verulam, vote the same.-Carried. Adjourned.

COME IN CROWDS.-The Salvation Army intend opening fire on all enemies of Christianity in Lindsay, on Sunday, July 29th, in the opera house, commencing at 11 a. m., 3 and 7:30 p. m., and continuing every night in the week in the music hall at 8 p. m. There will be open air services half an hour before each indoor service. As the army is a strong one and a large quantity of ammunition is in store the battle is likely to rage here for many months, we trust with great success. At all events the enemy and his emissaries shall receive no quarter from us.

Mr. Orange Fraser, of Columbus, Ohio, says the Peterboro Review, was the first American member of the A. C. A. to reach our waters. He launched his canoe at Port Perry about ten days ago and paddled round the chain of waters by way of Lindsay, Bobcaygeon, Buckhorn, Stony Lake, and thence down to Peterboro'.

He arrived here on Friday, and was met by some members of the reception committee, who took him about town as much as his limited time would allow, one of the members escorting him some distance down the river, where he camped for the night. After a visit to the Thousand Islands, he will return in time for the camp on the 10th of August. He reports that he received every attention from the Grand Trunk and Midland railway authorities, and had no trouble whatever in bringing his canoe along, or in finding his way by means of the map and descriptions of the route furnished to him.

SAYS the Peterboro Review.-Lindsay is once more to the front for the agility and shrewdness displayed by her "Smart" policeman. One of our citizens while travelling to Toronto was arrested at Lindsay in mistake for another man, said to answer the description of the gentleman who was so nearly locked up. The following appears in the Mail: "Mr. A. T. Smith, agent of the Bell Telephone Company at Peterboro', narrowly escaped a sojourn in durango vile while on his way home to Toronto, a short while ago. On stepping from the train at Lindsay he was approached by a policeman, who said he answered the appearance of a man he was in search of, and must consider himself under arrest. A friend happened to come along and identified him, and Mr. Smith was released. This account is open to criticism. Chief Smart did not arrest the man, but asked him his name, which he gave and on request for a reference substantiated it by the station master. Mr. Smith answered the description to a nicety, but not the slightest move was made to arrest him and no further questions were asked other than to certify to his name. Nor was the man wanted on the train, although the telegram stated plainly that he was. Mr. Smart as ostensible could do nothing except what he did, and as he fulfilled his instructions our contemporaries should at least be honest enough to state the truth regarding his actions.

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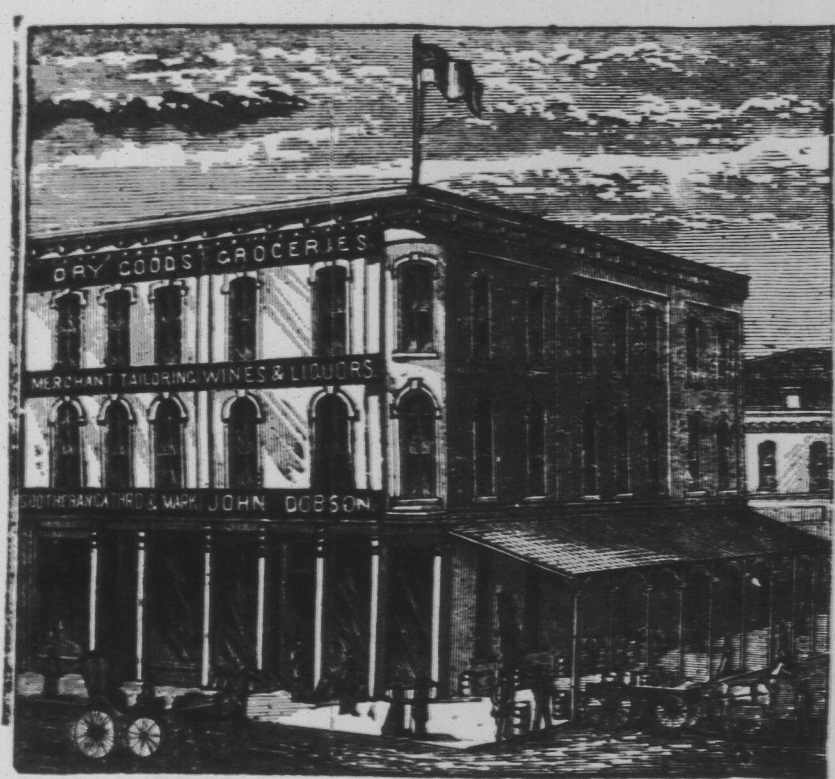
