We have been led into making the above remarks by the attitude and utterances recently of two so-called independent political journals.

THE RAILWAY DEBT.

The first shot fired by the town council against the amalgamation scheme of Mr. D. J. McIntyre respecting the Midland Railway was made by Mr. Crandell on Monday evening in moving that no further provision be made by the council for the railway debt till the road became willing to fulfil its part of the agreement by making the different lines competitive and giving lower rates in freight.

That the gentlemen who acted for the town in the negotiations and drawing up of the bond between the two corporations were very lax no one disputes, but as the mistakes cannot now be remedied there is little use in talking about them.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

We regret to learn the death of Rev. Mr. Nett, editor of the Bowmanville B. C. Observer. The deceased gentleman was taken ill with cramps in his stomach on Monday evening of last week and died on Sunday.

The mayor wrote the P. O. inspector a few days ago regarding the mails to the east, there being considerable dissatisfaction with present Montreal facilities. The inspector, however, sent word in reply that he can do nothing more than has been done, owing to the train service, and the only recourse will be for the town to obtain more railway conveniences.

The council on Monday evening granted \$200 to aid in getting up a central exhibition this year in Lindsay. This with the \$300 raised by the citizens will make the amount sufficient and will insure a good exhibition.

The motion to postpone the Muskoka election trial owing to the absence of H. H. Smith, R.R. Pringle and John Shields from the province was disposed of on Saturday. Hector Cameron, Q. C., and E. Arnoldi appeared for the respondent and Jan Bethune, Q. C., and W. Johnston for the petitioner.
