ONE morning last week the express car of the Toronto train was found to be on fire shortly after leaving Toronto. The fire was between the double flooring of the car. The floor had to be ripped up to get at the fire, which was put out after three attempts. It is supposed to have originated from a spark from the locomotive.

An agreement has been entered into between the Grand Trunk, Midland and Northern railways that hereafter refined or crude petroleum from all points in Canada (west of Kingston inclusive) must have the customs charges paid at the frontier port of entry. Cars loaded with petroleum are to be unloaded at once on their arrival at destination.

SOME big cutting is being done in Parkin's mill the past few days. One week recently 156 thousand and a half were cut with a single handed machine, and the large circular is doing faster work than it has ever done before, even in the good old days when run by Trude. The mill is evidently not played yet by any means, and is being worked to its full capacity the present summer.

MONEY appears to be plentiful in Lindsay just now. Last week a pocket-book was picked up containing \$70 and we believe the finder forgot to return it to the owner. This week again Mr. E. Veitch found a pocket-book still more valuable, the owner of which has not turned up. Such carelessness with money is an evidence of plenty, at least so we would suppose who never can raise more than 25 cents at a time.

THE ISLAY AFFAIR.—We have received this week a communication from Mrs. J. Hamilton, of Islay, likewise further correspondence from our correspondent concerning Mr. Brain, and others. As this controversy has gone far enough and no good can result to either party by its continuance we must refuse any further space in our columns to this matter. Any difference therefore between Mrs. Hamilton and our correspondent or between Mr. Geo. Brain and our correspondent must be considered as amicably arranged and no further wordy contests between them can take place through these columns.

In our report of the proceedings of the Board of Education last week Mr. McNeill's remarks as to the financial view of the question of filling Mr. Smith's place until the end of the year were not as full as was necessary to make the matter understood. The explanation made was that of \$2,000, the Government pays 45 per cent, the county 45 per cent, (the county is required by the statute to contribute an equivalent to the Government grant), leaving only 10 per cent. to be paid by the school division. Therefore the saving to the town by leaving the position vacant and carrying on the work to the end of the year with three teachers would be only about \$20.

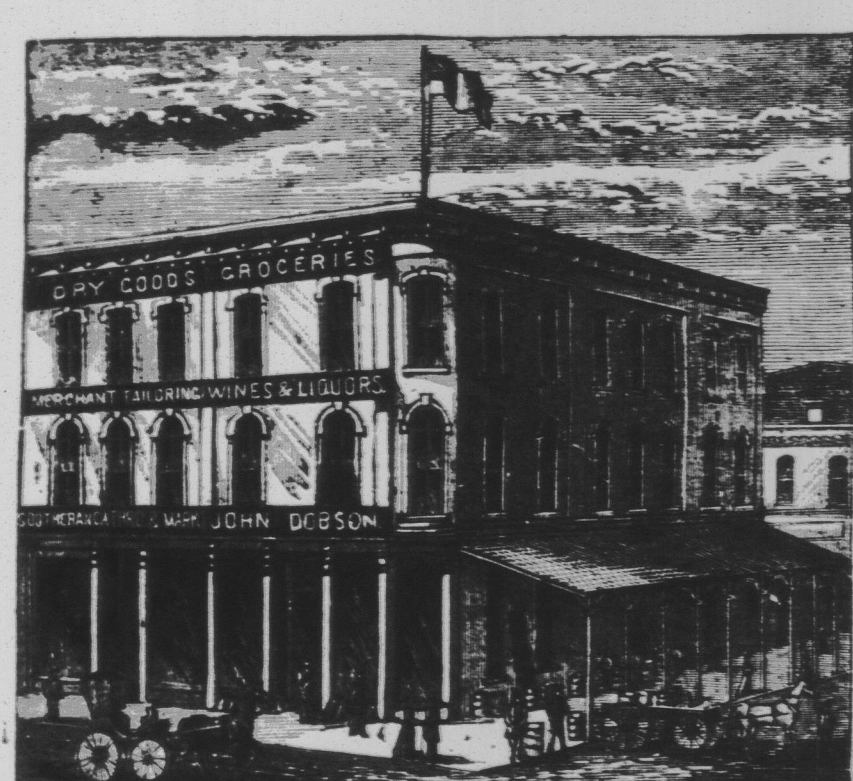
