In our report of the proceedings of the Board of Education last week Mr. Mc-Neillie's remarks as to the financial view of the question of filling Mr. Smith's place of the question of filling Mr. Smith's place until the end of the year were not as full as was necessary to make the matter understood. The explanation made was that of salaries in the high school in excess of \$2,000, the Government pays 45 per cent., the county 45 per cent.
