News of the Week.

Daniel Wm. Karcher's Sons, manufacturers of furniture, Philadelphia, have failed for \$50,000.
Twelve stores and six warehouses were burned at Crawford, Minn., Friday night. Loss \$100,000.
A case of yellow fever is rumored at New Orleans. Two new cases are reported at Pensacola, Fla.
Two daughters of the Rev. Mr. Wilson, Cartersville, Ga., while bathing on Thursday in an ore pit filled with water were drowned.
William C. B. Thornton, a prominent Brooklyn lawyer, was arrested charged with appropriating \$2,700 belonging to a client.
Thos. J. Owen, Jr., a wealthy young man of Hartford, Conn., a victim of drink, jumped from a boat at Twin lakes and drowned.
Chas. Ingram was fatally shot Friday night on the streets of Cincinnati, by his brother-in-law, C. W. Richardson. The cause was a domestic quarrel.
The St. Louis authorities have discovered that the enactment under which saloon keepers claim the right to keep open on Sunday was never legalized.
One hundred and seventy-five failures were reported this week, eight more than last. Middle States 42, New England 29, Southern 19, Western 50, Pacific and territories 34, Canada 20.
The saw mill of the Kester lumber company, Molino, Ill., was destroyed by fire on Saturday morning. The loss on the building was \$90,000 and \$200,000 worth of lumber was destroyed. Insurance \$90,000.
In December, 1872, the brig New Dominion sailed from Cow Bay, Cape Breton and was never heard of afterwards. Her hull was discovered a few days ago by divers at work on the wreck of the Cedar Grove, which struck a reef and sunk near Torbay.
It is estimated that the English home grain crop will be two million quarters less than last year. Some English papers are building hopes of an active competition against the United States from India and Siberia. This cannot take place for some years.
A daughter of Mr. William Gunning of Blanchard, Ont., was trying to straighten a needle in her month the other day when it broke, and one half went down her throat. The doctor cannot get it, and it is feared it will work to the heart and kill her.
The decomposed remains of Nicholas Skerret, a well known real estate dealer of San Francisco, were discovered in a vacant house, belonging to him on Saturday. It is supposed he was murdered as he was seen entering the house on Monday with three men.
Mr. Paul, of Crawfordville, has been engaged to marry Miss Moore, of Ashland, Ohio. A few days ago he received a telegram to come to Ashland as Miss Moore was not expected to live. He went. When he entered the young lady's room she raised up in bed, muttered his name, threw her arms about him, and died.
Two weeks ago Dr. Frank Roe, of the Medical college, Chicago, felt a prickling prickle of his upper lip and declaring it was a malignant carbuncle closed his office, went home, and prepared to die. Friends tried to encourage him, but he persisted that death must result. A second carbuncle appeared, blood poisoning ensued, and he died Friday.
Doctors from India, who have been sent to Egypt to combat the cholera, say that the disease now raging in the latter country is a comparatively mild form of the dreaded pestilence and not of the true Asiatic type. And it is said that the usual rise of the Nile, now in full progress, must have an important effect in diminishing the exhalation of miasmatic matter from the soil, which is another favorable consideration. A week or two more will probably tell whether the scourge is likely to reach Europe and America.
A powerful dog, ferocious with hydrophobia, took charge of the principal streets of St. Johns, N. F., Friday morning for nearly an hour. The animal broke into one house and attacked a baby lying in its cradle, and severely injured the mother of the child, who went to its rescue. The dog next attacked a man at his shop door, biting and lacerating his hand. One of the police engaged in running down the rabid brute was also injured severely. Several dogs were bitten, and the clothes torn off some small boys. The mad dog was at length shot, as were also all the bitten canines.
The particulars are just made public of a sad accident which occurred on the 4th inst. of a young man who was shot on Sunday night. James Dunn told his brother Patrick to take the gun and shoot a crow. He attempted to do so, but the gun did not go off. On returning to the house a squabble ensued between the brothers as to whether the gun was loaded, during which the weapon was discharged; the contents—slug shot—passed completely through a young lady who was visiting at the Dunn's. She was their cousin. The girl died at eleven o'clock on Tuesday morning and was buried on the 5th. Patrick Dunn, after the affair, was seized with a severe fever, and is now a raving maniac. His two sisters also have lost

their reason. The grandfather of the young man who committed the deed is also insane and attempted to cut his throat.
A man named Henry Moss, returning from Algoma Mills, by the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway, fell off the train, near Flesherton, and was killed, while attempting to pass from one car to another.
A drunken man assaulted a woman in Trenton on Monday last week. She escaped from him and fled for protection. He followed her, when a number of women "went for" him and gave him a terrible drubbing. He will probably let the women alone hereafter.
An immense agricultural implement factory, with \$1,000,000 to back it, will be established shortly at London. It has for its chief object the building of implements for the Northwest. A Manitoba firm of dealers, which has hitherto struggled to push American implements only, offers to take half a million dollars worth of Canadian make annually.
Marwood, the hangman, has again distinguished himself for brutality. He hanged a man at Durham, and appeared on the scaffold drunk. The rope caught under the man's elbow and he had to pull him back out of the pit and fling him down again, the circumstances being of the most shocking character. It is thought the Home Secretary will dismiss Marwood.
A Western exchange discounts current fish stories by telling an old hunter's curious experience. He was looking at his traps along a stream when he espied an old muskrat on the bank. Raising his gun he fired and then jumped down to keep the rat from getting into the water. "Believe it or not," he added, "I jumped so quick that I got the whole charge of the shot in my back!"
The authorities are greatly desirous that Corey's murderer's trial take place at Cape Town. The murder took place outside the colonial jurisdiction, but it is thought that the venue can be legally changed to where it is believed conviction for murder in the first degree can be secured. In London O'Donnell would be considered by a vast number of people as a hero or political criminal and his trial would provoke excitement.
A new crusade is started in New York against children. Landlords will not rent flats to large families and in every case give the preference to those who have no offspring, even in the matter of ordinary houses. The Herodian policy is intolerable. The world ought to have room enough for the youngsters, and landlords ought to be taught that the wear and tear of children is part and parcel of their risk in building houses for rent.
The C. P. R. bridge over the Saskatchewan river, to be the largest on the entire line has been contracted for. The bridge will be one thousand feet long from bank to bank; will have seven piers of solid masonry, and will cost fully five hundred thousand dollars; Major E. J. Bowles, of Winnipeg, will build the piers, his bid of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars for masonry work having been accepted by the North American Contracting Company. The iron work will be brought from Germany.
James Coyle, a fisherman, says that one morning about sunrise he was standing on the shore of Sturgeon Bay when he saw something which he at first thought was a log. He was about to go to it in a boat to pick it up. The object moved as though it was a thing of life, and suddenly a huge bar head rose several feet above the surface of the water and a horrible hissing sound issued from it. He began throwing stones at it, whereupon the strange reptile made toward him at considerable speed. The fisherman then became thoroughly frightened and ran toward his house as fast as his legs would carry him. Coyle says the serpent was about thirty feet in length and about two feet in diameter.
There is in Hampshire county W. Va., a human monstrosity which exceeds anything Barnum ever exhibited. It is a young woman, or child, born in Pennsylvania in 1835 and therefore 18 years old, who is in everything but age an infant. A gentleman who recently saw her, and learned her age from reliable authority, found her lying in a cradle. She is 28 inches in height, weighs but 25 pounds, cannot walk or talk, and eats nothing but milk, which is fed from a bottle. She has, however, a quick perception and remarkable memory, and a poem or sentence repeated to her once, and weeks afterwards again repeated with but one word varying crosses her anger, and she frowns at the changed word. An article laid down in the room and in her sight may be allowed to remain for days; yet the enquiry for it will be answered by the child by pointing to it. She is quite an attractive baby, and no reason for her stunted growth has ever been assigned. The facts narrated above seem to be well attested, and many physicians have visited the child without being able to conjecture the cause of her condition.
The large steamer Glenfinlas was burnt to the water's edge while lying in the new Welland canal on Friday night just before midnight. The steamer was lying about half a mile above the Niagara street bridge. The fire had gained considerable headway ere the firemen reached the scene, and when they did their services could not be utilized, owing to the long distance from a fire hydrant. The steamer was then ordered out and soon got in position and threw a steady stream in the burning ship for several hours, but all efforts were useless. The fire continued to burn until 7 o'clock in the morning, when having burnt to the water's edge she sank out of sight. There is at present no telling as to the origin of the fire. The hands on board had to make some lively movements to reach the tow-path. The reason of the steamer being moored in the canal at the point indicated was to receive some little repairs to her engine, a couple of bolts having broken on the way down disabling her. Several vessels passed the scene during the fire. None of them stopped to render any assistance. None of the canal officials put in an appearance for several hours. The Glenfinlas was owned jointly by Capt. Harry Zealand, who sailed her, and James Turner & Co., wholesale grocers, of Hamilton. The steamer was valued at \$25,000 and her cargo at \$30,000.
