No police court this week again. Our constables are either idle or the town is getting quieter. Yet we have a good few roughs yet, judging by one or two evenings this week.

THE road and bridge committee are filling up the holes on all the principal streets of the town with good gravel and which will improve them considerably when the wet weather sets in.

THE Guide says that on Saturday morning while making up the excursion train in the yard at Port Hope, George Thompson, a brakeman hailing from Orillia, got his hand crushed between the buffers.

It is rumored that the Lindsay paper mill has gone into liquidation and that the company intends going out of business. This will cause some loss to the business interests of Lindsay, especially to the farmers. It was at all events a good thing for Lindsay that the council did not grant the new engine they desired the town should put in for their benefit.

TRAINS are run steadily now between Cobecok and Lindsay. From ten to eleven each morning and again in the evening is a busy time at the depot and requires close watching to keep the track clear. As, however, everything is worked on a systematic scale, one train is always out of the way before the other comes along and as new sidings are being laid, there will soon be accommodation for all the cars on the south side of the depot.

BIG FISH.—This appears to be a good year for fish in the waters of the mighty Scougog. Some very large maskinonge have been caught at different times and some good sized bass. Messrs. Demary and Bates, however, on Tuesday brought home two large bass which were the admiration of all beholders and it is more than probable were the largest ever brought into Lindsay. They were in fact so large that many people could scarcely believe they were bass.

MR. R. Touchburn, sr., father of Mr. R. Touchburn, merchant, met with a serious accident near the Riverside cemetery, on Thursday afternoon of last week. He was driving a young and slightly wild horse, when two boys happened to meet him with a bundle of hay on their heads, which frightened the horse and it ran away, soon throwing Mr. Touchburn out and seriously wounding his head. Mr. Armstrong, the pop manufacturer, coming along, brought him into Lindsay and we are pleased to say he is now rapidly improving.

FIRE.—Shortly before three o'clock yesterday morning the house and premises owned by Mr. Brooks on Kent street, near Needler & Sandler's mill, took fire and very soon were burnt to the ground. How the fire originated is not known, but the supposition is that some coals had dropped from the stove through the opening between the floor. At all events the fire had made too much headway when the firemen arrived and it was speedily burnt down along with considerable cordwood. The occupants, named Terry, also lost considerable in furniture, etc. The building was insured.

SAYS the Orillia Packet: "Some of the Hamilton excursionists lost themselves in town on Monday, and could not find their way back to the railway station. Will the Lindsay WARDER, which is so ignorant of the extent of Orillia as to call it an antediluvian apology for a village, kindly make a note of this?" This is evidently the fault of a shade tree planted a year or two ago by the Orillia council. One of the trees happened to be between them and the town and having leaves on at this season, naturally hid the "town" from view. These excursionists evidently did not know much or they would have taken a compass with them when trying to find Orillia from the railway station.

THE GAME LAWS.—Every year sportsmen get themselves into trouble through ignorance of the laws which govern the killing of game. A careful perusal of the following, which mark the beginning and end of the period during which it is lawful to kill game, will serve to guide them in their future operations. Ruffed and pinnated grouse, Sept. 1-Jan. 1; quail, Oct. 1-Jan. 1; woodcock, Aug. 1-May 1; wildfowl, Aug. 15-May 1; wild turkey, Oct. 1-Jan. 1; deer and elk, Oct. 1-Dec. 15; moose, Sept. 15-Dec. 15; caribou, Oct. 1-Dec. 15; rabbit (here) Sept. 1-March 1; snipe, Aug. 15-Jan. 1; speckled trout, May 1-Sept. 15; black bass, May 15-April 15; maskinonge and pickerel, May 15-April 15; lake-trout, trout, Nov. 15-Nov. 1; Mallard, grey, black, wood, summer and teal ducks, Aug. 15-Jan. 1. Battery, punt gun, sunken punt, night-light, for bidden in wildfowl shooting. Imported game may not be killed without consent of land owner. It is forbidden to kill for exportation "deer, elk, moose, reindeer, or caribou."

THE iron for the new Midland railway bridge has arrived, and is being put together preparatory to placing it on the piers. The grading is also being pushed rapidly, and the ties and rails will be laid almost at once. When completed this and most substantial bridge along the line. It is expected to be completed and trains running over it by October 1st.

THE annual excursion and picnic of the employees of the Midland Railway of Canada was held on Saturday. Hutton's grove was the picnic ground, where the employees from along the line and their friends assembled. The Port Hope train was waiting at Millbrook when the Peterborough contingent arrived there, and the two trains were joined in one, making an immense train of twenty-eight cars. From Millbrook to Bethany three locomotives drew the train, and from that station to Lindsay two engines did the work. Lindsay was reached at eleven o'clock, and here the train was delayed for over an hour, and it was after twelve o'clock when the excursionists arrived at the picnic ground. The first event on the programme after the arrival at the grove was dinner. The grove was transformed, as by magic, from a quiet wood to a populous town of about five thousand inhabitants. Every tree was a house, under the shelter of whose "roof tree" a family took shelter, and many of the larger trees were tenement houses where more than one family party lodged. Dinner having been partaken of, the sports began. A large dancing platform was continually occupied, the music for the dancing being furnished by Harris' string band, of Lindsay. A large crowd witnessed the sports, while others amused themselves in various ways. The programme was a very long one, and the fact that it was fully carried out is creditable to the committee of management. The prizes were valuable, and the greater part of them were presented by the business men of Peterborough and Port Hope, Lindsay and other points along the road. The judges were Messrs. C. H. While the other sports were going on the dancing platform was cleared and a competition began for prizes. This competition was very interesting, and the crowd gave evidence of the pleasure felt by repeatedly cheering. These were night prizes for dancing, and they were won as follows:—Waltz—Mr. W. J. Foster and Miss Maggie Foster. Schottische—Mr. Curran and Miss Scott. Irish jig—Mr. J. Driscoll and Mrs. J. Mercer. Best lady step dancer—Mrs. B. Kelly. Hornpipe—Miss Mary Mahar. The sports were concluded at about six o'clock. During the afternoon there were a number of toy races for children under eight years of age, which caused considerable amusement for the children and for older persons also. At six o'clock the grove was almost empty, and the sports were gathered at the midway track waiting for the train. The Cobecok and Midland north train first departed, followed by the Haliburton train and the Toronto and Whitby regular trains. The Peterborough and Port Hope train departed at about 7 o'clock, but was again delayed some time at Lindsay. Between Lindsay and Millbrook the cars unaccompanied—once and a portion of the train was left behind, causing further delays, as the engines had to back up after them.

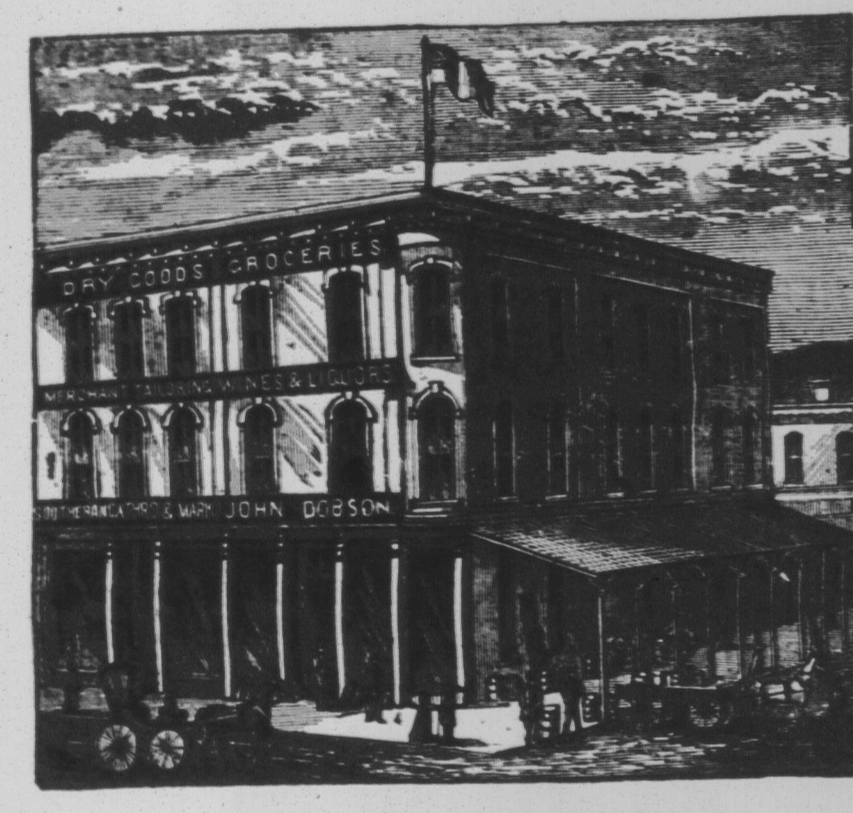
