**News of the Week.**

Leprosy has been discovered among the Chinese in Nevada.  
Spanish military authorities wish to continue the state of siege.  
The wheat acreage in Manitoba is 20 per cent. more than last year.  
China is negotiating with Germany for the purchase of 100,000 rifles.  
Great rejoicing is reported at Sligo in honor of the Home Rule victory.  
Italians and Austrians had a fight at Trieste, and several were wounded.  
An outbreak of pleuro-pneumonia is reported among cattle at Salem, Conn.  
Rev. Wm. Baker, of Boston, a well known author, died on Monday week.  
Schaefer defeated Wallace at billiards in San Francisco Thursday, by 600 to 500.  
The United States post-office shows a surplus of \$2,500,000 for the past fiscal year.  
The Nickhack volunteer company of Rutland, Vt., is on visit to Montreal.  
A large shipment of Clydesdales has been received at Montreal for western breeders.  
Pilgrims from Canada to the Shrine of the Lady of Lourdes have been presented to the Pope.  
The wheat crop in the county of Kent is a failure. Eight bushels an acre is the average yield.  
Hon. Donald A. Smith has presented \$50,000 to McGill University to endow a medical chair.  
New Brunswick has been substituted for Nepigon stone in erection of public works at Ottawa.  
His Excellency the Governor-General and Princess Louise will visit Kingston on the 10th of September.  
One registration district in Alberta, N. W. T., comprises 37,000 square miles and another 68,000 square miles.  
George Stephen, president of the Canadian Pacific railway, has donated \$50,000 to the Montreal general hospital.  
The Florida ship canal scheme is to be pushed with vigor. It will cost \$36,000,000 and will be 137 1/2 miles in length.  
Capt. Dandy, of the schooner Folger, has joined the ranks of the cranks. He wishes to swim Niagara's swirling waters.  
The Merchants' bank seeks to recover \$100,000 from H. B. Bagley, the bankrupt president of the South-Eastern railway.  
St. Petersburg authorities say the British Jew was expelled in accordance with the law forbidding Jews to live in the city.  
A severe storm in Winnipeg on Monday, 20th inst., considerably damaged several public buildings, among others the penitentiary.  
The French vexatious passport rules have been adopted on the Russian frontier, and obstacles are being placed in the way of German travellers.  
Handsome subscriptions from Great Britain have been received at London, Ont., for the flood sufferers. Of \$18,000 received \$2,000 only remains.  
The Detroit wife murderer Phipps is very penitent. He is strictly watched for fear he should attempt suicide. He will be tried at Sandwich, Ont.  
United States railways have adopted a standard time taken from the 5th, 6th and seventh meridians west of Greenwich, to go into effect in September.  
An unknown schooner of 200 tons burden carrying a black flag is reported to have sunk off Beach Haven, N. J. There is great excitement in the district.  
M. Tricon, French ambassador at Peking, has been recalled on account of ill-health. This is considered an admission that Franco-Chinese negotiations have been suspended.  
John Woods, formerly a well-to-do farmer in the township of Charlotteville, committed suicide yesterday in Norfolk county jail, where he was confined for forging a note for \$200.  
The Americanist students of early American history opened their fifth congress at Copenhagen. The Princess of Wales and members of the royal family of Denmark were present.  
It is proposed to drive the course of the river Thames so that it will run behind the village of London West. Another suggestion is to erect an embankment. Either plan it is thought would prevent any more disastrous floods.  
Complaint is made at Buffalo that a visiting lodge of A. O. U. W. on a recent visit to Hamilton, Ont., were compelled by the police to carry the Union Jack in advance of the American flag. The stars and stripes consider themselves insulted.  
A strike among the hands of the steamer Newsum occurred on account of some disagreement as to wages and extra allowance for the Sunday trips to the Thousand Islands, and the request of the men not being acceded to the mate and crew left the steamer. Two of the men were arrested on a charge of desertion of their employment, but were released on their own recognizances. The following morning, however, they were discharged, as no one appeared to prosecute them. The strike was delayed in consequence of the regular trip somewhat short handed, but since then a full complement of new hands, including a temporary mate, has been secured, and everything moves along

as though nothing unusual had taken place.  
The Imperial Parliament was prorogued on Saturday.  
Pleiot shipped 600 tons of coal to Boston last week.  
The Portage la Prairie assessment roll foots up to \$5,330,235.  
It is said that China has within her limits 1,092,618 Catholics.  
The United States potter's association has determined to advance prices.  
Black rust is causing serious damage to the potato crop in New York State.  
Mr. J. C. Bonner has been appointed bandmaster of the Guard's band at Ottawa.  
King Milan, of Servia, is in Vienna and has exchanged visits with the Emperor of Austria.  
Less than one hundred deaths from cholera were reported in Egypt on the 20th inst.  
A rising of the Ghilzais is reported to have occurred at Simla against the Ameer of Afghanistan.  
A meeting has been arranged between Sullivan and Ryan to take place at Boston in December.  
Mrs. Hamilton of Grand Rapids, Mich., was mistaken by her husband for a burglar and fatally shot.  
An earthquake at Pachuca, Mexico, caused twenty deaths and the destruction of thirty houses.  
The miners of the Tuscawarus valley will insist on an advance of ten cents per ton after September 1.  
A new Presbyterian church has been opened at Moosejaw, N. W. T., with a seating capacity of 300.  
Robert E. Withers, of Virginia, has been elected grand master of the Knights Templar of San Francisco.  
O'Donnell, who shot the informer Carey, will sail from Capetown for England on the 4th September.  
By an explosion in a colliery near Cardiff, Wales, one minor was killed and twenty-seven seriously injured.  
The provincial synod has set aside Assiniboia as a diocese, and the appointment of a bishop is in the hands of the prime minister.  
And now a Frenchman arrives from Paris to swim the whirlpool rapids on a wager of \$10,000 with the Count de Lagrange.  
The barristers of Moosejaw have prepared a charter to incorporate Moosejaw as a city at the next meeting of the North-west council.  
A ferret has been found at Georgetown after eight years' absence. The animal was brought from England in 1871, and is now fifteen years old.  
The American Rapid Telegraph Company have notified their employees that the same hours and the same wages will prevail as before the strike.  
The work on the Tay canal, extending from the Rideau canal to Perth, is being forwarded with considerable speed by a gang of more than 100 workmen.  
The English missionary Shaw, whose arrest and detention by the French in Madagascar threatened serious trouble, has been acquitted and liberated.  
Andrew Weaver, of Bothwell, has, it is stated, received official notification that he has fallen heir to \$1,250,000. Mr. Weaver, of Bothwell, is his only living heir.  
A species of midge has attacked the second crop of clover in the Galt neighborhood. Its ravages are pretty general, and clover seed is likely to be very scarce.  
The people of Moosejaw have drawn up resolutions approving of the resignation of the directors of the temperance colony to build a line of railway from Moosejaw to Saskatoon.  
The French have made a brilliant and successful attack on the forts and batteries of the Hue River. A blockade followed. The Annamites are greatly alarmed at the movements of the French.  
The Counts de Chambard and de Frobenius, Friday, the supposed consciousness till the moment of his decease. The Paris Royalists papers appeared with mourning borders out of respect to him. The Republican journals speak in respectful terms of the deceased.  
The Orangeville Sun says that the financial condition of the town is alarming. The assessment has been largely increased, but the rate of taxation is as high as ever. It is said that council is run by party politicians for their own interests, and not for the people.  
Moncton Times.—The wife of Fabien Breen, of Cocagne, is an enterprising sort of a woman, if our information is correct. On Friday, Aug. 10th, she gave birth to triplets, and within a period of fifteen months her progeny numbers five, she having previously given birth to twins.  
The American lumber company's barn at Dollarville, Mich., was burned to the ground, together with sixteen dwelling houses and all their contents. Two children were burned to death, and a great many people escaped with only what clothes they had on. The loss is estimated at \$120,000.  
A cyclone swept across Minnesota on Tuesday week, blowing down buildings, and killing and severely injuring many persons. A passenger train was blown from the track, and over a hundred killed and injured. All the telegraph wires were blown down, so that the full extent of the damage cannot at present be ascertained.  
The Kelly, Toronto, a hackman, was fined \$2 at the police court for demanding more than his legal fare from a daughter of chief constable Draper for driving her from Young street wharf to 324 King street west. The defendant's excuse was that he had to carry the young lady's trunk up stairs, and that he lost time in getting change for a five dollar bill.  
Eliza Baggs is a native of Servien county, Ga. She went to Florida at six years of age, married at thirteen, and her first child was born when she was only fourteen. She is now thirty-one and has had eighteen children (twice twice) fifteen of whom are now living. She is hale and hearty, and has the reputation of being one of the hardest working women in Florida.  
The army of cranks who propose to swim the Niagara Falls rapids, or attempt crazy jumps from the bridge, seems to receive fresh accessions daily. The latest is a Buffaloian named Hoffman, a paper-hanger, who means to brave the treacherous currents and rocks of the whirlpool rapids in the attempt to swim them. Hoffman states his intention of making the attempt without previous warning. He spent two days at the rapids last week, carefully studying currents, rocks and probabilities and possibilities, and came away satisfied that the feat can be safely accomplished. Hoffman says Rhodes is

a crank, and doesn't intend to swim the rapids at all.  
Black smallpox is prevailing in Tomatlan, Mexico.  
A battalion of British troops have been ordered to Zululand.  
Foot-and-mouth disease has broken out among cattle at Spalding, Eng.  
Thirty miners were killed by an explosion in a colliery near Cardiff, Wales.  
The rioting between Protestants and Catholics at Coalbridge has been renewed.  
A bottle-nosed shark caught near Pictou, N. S., has been creating great interest.  
Porto Rico, Cuba, has suffered severely from damage by a great storm and flood.  
Kilam, on the west coast, has been added to Great Britain's African possessions.  
Al. Smith, the backer of John L. Sullivan, is finding \$500 for Slade in his match with Charles Mitchell.  
The report that France will shortly mobilize her Eastern army corps attracts serious attention in Berlin.  
France has given assurance that Mr. Shaw, the English missionary to Madagascar, will have a fair trial.  
The governor and councillors of Florida have been captured by brigands, who value their heads at 200,000.  
A ghastly discovery of the decomposed bodies of twelve children has been made in a Bermuda undertaker's establishment.  
It is stated that Sir Stafford Northcote will probably resign the leadership of the English Conservative on account of poor health.  
The Chinese Government have made preparation to France for the murder of missionaries in Yunnan, and will punish the murderers.  
The main office of the Western Union Telegraph Company at Chicago, into which 300 wires run, was destroyed by fire Tuesday week.  
In the election at St. John, N. B., last week for the Provincial Assembly, Messrs. McLellan and Stockton, Government supporters, were returned.  
An English lady named Mrs. Allen recently attempted to beat the twenty-four hour bicycle record, and succeeded in covering 152 miles.  
Destructive forest fires are raging on the Green Mountains, Maine. The only hope for their extinguishment is in a heavy downfall of rain.  
It was reported in New York that Mackay, James Gordon Bennett, and another had subscribed a sufficient sum to build two Atlantic cables.  
Dimension is said to exist among the members of the Kingston police force, and the night constables are accused of sleeping instead of doing their duty.  
A Liberal member has given notice that he will offer a resolution next session declaring the expediency of granting a measure of Home Rule to Ireland.  
The Grand Trunk railway has inaugurated a war of passenger rates between Chicago and Buffalo on round trip tickets. The other roads interested met the cut.  
Bishop McCormack, of Achonry, Ireland, will probably be the prelate selected to canvass America for subscriptions in aid of the migration scheme for poor Irish.  
Ten colonies have accepted the invitation to attend a conference at Melbourne to discuss the question of the annexation of Guinea and other islands in the Pacific.  
Information has been received at Washington that the Pensacola authorities are concealing the truth concerning the yellow fever, and that the disease is epidemic there.  
At the billiard tournament in San Francisco on Tuesday week, Schaefer was a game of billiard with Saxon in two hours. Schaefer scored 690 and Saxon 542.  
Fred. Wood, of Leicester, Eng., is now the one-mile champion bicyclist of the world, having beaten Richard Howell, of Coventry, at Wolverhampton a few weeks ago. Time, 2 mins. 56 1/5 sec.  
An Italian manager, Pollini, has offered the widow of Richard Wagner \$250,000 for the exclusive right to perform the opera of "Parsifal" this to cover all countries. She unhesitatingly rejected the offer.  
A French seronant had a terrible experience last week, being caught by his two fingers in a rope just as the balloon was ascending, and in this manner dragged four miles through the air in excruciating agony.  
Wm. Miller, wrestler and athlete, has left Australia for New York. Richard K. Fox is to back him for \$1,000 to \$5,000 to box Sullivan, Shoriff, Paddy Ryan, or any other pugilist, or to fight with bare knuckles.  
Severe fighting took place between the French and Annamese troops at Hanoi on the 17th, the former receiving a decided check. The French force is stated to be inadequate in numbers and equipment to the work they have undertaken.  
The Congregationalist states that the unnamed donor of \$10,000 to the library fund of Olivet College was the late Mrs. Lucy E. Tuttle, of Guilford, Conn. She made the gift as a memorial of her son Willy Sage Tuttle, whose name it will bear.  
Excitement has been caused in St. Catharines by the finding of a human skull in the hold of the burned schooner Glenfalls. None of the crew of the ill-fated boat are missing, and conjecture is rife as to how the ghastly relic came to be there.  
The mania for notoriety is spreading rapidly and bids fair to become epidemic ere long among a certain class of intellect. A Bradford, Pa., drug clerk has caught the infection badly, and proposes to leap from the Kinross viaduct into the stream 310 feet below.  
John Shay, the Washington market butcher, Thorsby, offers to match an unknown pugilist to fight any man in the county, black or white, weighing from 125 to 160 pounds, under the new rules of the London prize ring, for from \$250 to \$1,000 a side.  
A Hong Kong despatch states that the progress of Canton are greatly excited over the action of the French in Tonquin. Notices have been posted calling on the people to rise and slaughter the barbarians. The Europeans are greatly alarmed and an appeal has been made to the British command for protection.  
There is war to the knifely among the Gift specialists at Rat Portage. One of the fraternity who was overcome by the potent effects of tangle-leg was punished upon by his brothers, who, mistaking him for a Hamite man, after some rough usage, landed him in goal. He now threatens an exposure of the inner working of the Gift ring.
