News of the Week. The high court of forestry has a surplus of \$2,950. The Minister of Marine is visiting the maritime provinces. A telephone line is being established between Toronto and Kingston. Squire Hannas of London East, is to be sued for excessive costs. A large trade in cattle is being done between Kingston and Cape Vincent. The Midland Railway is doing a great business in shipping lumber and grain. 3,000 deaths occurred in Montreal last year, being 27.3 per 1,000 of the population. Montreal capitalists contemplate the building of a new dock at Halifax, N. S. The Indian department of Prince Albert district has about 100 acres under crop this year. A new postal inspection district is to be made out of the Ottawa district. Mr. Ledue, of Hull, is to be the new inspector. A dangerous leak is reported to lie directly in the path of vessels running between Killarney and Collingwood or Owen Sound. Rev. Dr. Carleton, an Irish by birth and recently prior of the Dominican convent at Rome, has been appointed Bishop of Hamilton. W. E. Conter, of Courtright, Lambton Co., a root beer manufacturer, is charged with forging a note for \$75 on Guard & Kiddemister's. An appeal is to be made to the Chief Justice of Manitoba to release the Ontario prisoners arrested at Rat Portage on a writ of habeas corpus. Two collisions at sea occurred on Saturday, one off Ushant and the other just off the Eddystone light. Several lives were lost in each collision. Returns to the department at Washington show an increase of five million acres in the lands taken up over the preceding year. An advance in the price of coal has been made by the Reading company on eastern shipments, ranging from 10 to 25c. per ton. Dan Holmes, a G. T. R. conductor living at Goderich in the course of 27 years, has travelled a distance equal to journeying 64 times round the world. Mr. Sandford Fleming is in the North-west on his way to British Columbia to further a scheme for laying a cable between that province and Japan. Letters patent have been issued to the Geary Bros. Canadian stock breeders and importers association of London, Ont., with a capital stock of \$100,000. Attorney-General Howat will investigate the Guelph battery business. In the meantime information has been laid before the county attorney. The Egyptian Minister of Interior has started a fund for the relief of families of cholera victims, to which the English troops in Egypt will subscribe one day's pay. Thos. Marvin, of City, has recovered \$100 and cost against the Western Union for refusing to take telegraph messages otherwise than subject to delay. The case will be appealed. Sixty-five hundred Chinamen and 1,500 white men are working on the C. P. R. in British Columbia. The Chinese receive \$1 a day, and the white men \$1.75. Carpenters get \$2.50 a day. The formation of a union and a demand for increased wages by the grain shovellers of Kingston, Ont., has led to the adoption of steam shovellers, which means the discharge of 75 per cent. of the men. It is proposed to set a new county out of the townships of Norwich, Mars, Rams, Melont, Tay, a part of Oro, Orillia, Midland and three or four townships in Muskoka and christen it Torne. Orillia is to be the county town. Sir Henry Tyler and Mr. Joseph Hickson having finished the inspection of the Grand Trunk, have set for Chicago. Sir Henry intends making a trip over the Northern Pacific and will probably visit the North-west before his return to England. A Montreal merchant is investing a great deal of time and labor in an attempt to recover some gold and silver treasure supposed to have been buried many years ago on a small island in lake Champlain. The secret of its existence was imparted to him by his father. The lighthouse erected by the Government of Canada upon the summit of the small island known as Plateau or Flat Rock, off Cape Peter, Gaspé, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, will be put in operation on the 15th September next. The light will be a revolving white catoptric, attaining its brilliancy every two minutes. It is elevated about 77 feet above high water mark. On Sunday night in Toronto a stampede occurred among a herd of two or three hundred cattle which was confined in the cattle yards near the mouth of the Don. They managed to break their enclosures and scattered in all directions through the south eastern part of the city. One enterprising bullock took a leap into a culvert. The hole was five feet deep, and was just large enough to contain his bullockship. The animal made frantic endeavours to extricate himself, but was compelled to remain in the hole three hours until a gang of men after considerable work got him out. A company is being formed, with a capital of \$60,000, for the purpose of cultivating the different varieties of grapes peculiar to this country, and manufacturing wine therefrom on a large scale. The company, of which the professional directors are Messrs. Goldwin Smith, A. H. Campbell and H. Weston St. George, are sanguine of the success of the undertaking. The working expenses are estimated at about \$3,000, and as the vineyard, orchard and system factory are said to have an actual producing capacity of from \$11,000 to \$13,000, a net profit of \$8,000 or \$10,000 is expected for the first year's operations. As Frank Peters was walking on Dundas street, London, Tuesday, his foot hit a step ladder in front of J. O'Higgins' store, on which a painter was standing. The ladder collapsed, and the painter fell, striking his head on the point of a nail. The painter caught his head on an iron support, and lung suspended until he was taken down. Of course the poor painter came in for some sound advice, but the fact of his being deaf and dumb gave poor effect to the shower of adjectives.
