BY-LAW NO. 357,

A By-law to raise the sum of Two Thousand Dollars to aid in the construction of tile, stone or timber drains.

The municipality of the Township of Ops, pursuant to the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of Ontario, passed in the forty-second year of Her Majesty's reign, chaptered eight, enacts as follows:

1. That the Reeve of the said Township may from time to time, subject to the provisions of this By-law, borrow on the credit of the corporation of the said municipality, such sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of two thousand dollars, as may be decided by the said Council, and may in manner hereafter provided issue debentures of the said corporation in sums of one hundred dollars each vided issue debentures of the said debentures to have coupons attached as provided in the fourth section of said Act.

2. That when the Council shall be of opinion that the application of any person-or persons who may be assessed as owners of land in the said municipality, to

2. That when the Council shall be of opinion that the application of any persons or persons who may be assessed as owners of land in the said municipality, to borrow money for the purpose of constructing tile, stone or timber drains should be granted in whole or in part, then the said Council may by resolution instruct the said Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid and borrow such sum of money as does not exceed the amount applied for and may loan the same to the said applicant on the completion of said drainage works.

3. A special annual rate shall be imposed, levied and collected, over and above all other rates upon the land in respect of which the said money shall be borrowed sufficient for the payment of the interest and sinking fund as provided in the said
