By-law to provide for draining parts of the Township of Ops, and for borrowing on the credit of the Municipality the sum of Two Thousand, Seven Hundred and Ninety-Eight Dollars and Ninety-Three Cents, for completing the same.

Provisionally Adopted the 22nd day of October, A. D. 1883.

To the Recre and Council of the Township of Ops:

GENTLEMEN,—In accordance with your instructions to me I have made an examination of the lands proposed to be drained in the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Concessions of the Township of Ops, and have made a survey of the drains necessary to carry out your purpose, and herewith furnish you with a plan of such survey, together with a profile showing the levels and cutting of the same; also a specification of the work to be done in the construction of such drains, and a schedule showing, in my opinion, the proportionate benefit derived by every road and lot or portion of let of such lands so drained. My estimate of what the work should cost is as follows:

And whereas, the said council are of opinion that the drainage of the locality cribed is desirable. Be it therefore enacted by the said municipal council of the said Township of Ops, pursuant to the provisions of "The Consolidated Municipal Act of 1893":—

1. That the said report, by-laws and estimates be adopted, and the said drain and the work connected therewith be made and constructed in accordance there-

with.

2. That the Reeve of the said township may borrow on the credit of the corporation of the said Township of Ops the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-eight 93-100 dollars, being the funds necessary for the work, and may issue debentures of the corporation to that amount in sums of not less than \$100 each, and payable within fifteen years from the date thereof, with interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, that is to say, one of such debentures, including interest, to be payable at the Ontario Bank at Lindsay on the Fourteenth day of December in each year for fifteen years.

3. That for the purpose of paying the same of Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Right 60-100 Dollars, being the amount charged against the said lands so to be benefitted as aferesaid other than roads belonging to the municipality and to cover interest thereon for fifteen years at the rate of five percent per annum, the following special rates over and above all other special rates shall be assessed and levied (in the same manner and at the same time as taxes are levied) upon the undermentioned lots and parts of lots, and the amount of the said special rates and interest assessed as aferesaid against each lot or part of lot respectively shall be divided into fitteen equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed and levied as aforesaid in each year for fifteen years after the final passage of this by-law during which the said debentures have to run:—
