The Campbellford Herald is agitating for a new railway line. The route it proposes for the new road is from Cobourg to near Baltimore on the Cobourg and Peterborough Railway, a new line to be constructed running east to Centerton, north-east to Meyersburg, passing through Wakarusa, and north going through Campbellford to the Trent Bridge (Narrows), where it would connect with the line of the Cobourg, Peterborough and Marmora Company to the Blairton. The total length of the new line to be constructed is placed at thirty-six miles.

A meeting of the Guelph board of trade was held Wednesday night to consider the advisability of securing connection with the Credit Valley railway. The board was unanimous in the opinion that connection with the Credit Valley at Soham, or some station near there, was most desirable in the interests of the city.

A week ago, Rathburn & Co., of Deseronto, Ont., took a large number of laborers from Canada to Oswego, and several foremen were appointed to police them. On Saturday morning one of the specials was struck by a stone, and the next night a house was fired on and stones thrown at the building in which the Canadians were housed. The Canadians returned the fire, but no one was injured. Next morning 200 'longhairs' men appeared to the Canadians to quit work, but the Canadians refused to do so. Serious trouble is apprehended. A late dispatch says that some of the Canadians have agreed to go home and no serious trouble is now apprehended.

The Crillie Times says: The committee who have the important matter in hand of regulating the waters of the lakes have succeeded in inducing the Midland and Northern Railways to lease single fare return tickets to the gentlemen going shortly on the expedition to interview the Governor-General on the matter. Owing to the absence from Toronto of the Hon. the Commissioner of Public Works, a day has not yet been assigned by the Government for the reception of the deputation. From the statements of the secretary of the committee we have much reason to believe that the deputation will be the largest and most important that has ever taken place in the history of the Government for years. Very encouraging letters have been received from Geo. A. Cox, Esq., the manager of the Midland Railway; Chas. Drury, Esq.,

M.P.P.; Maloch, Esq., M.P.P.; O. J. Phelps, ex-M.P.P., and numerous others who were unable to be at the Orillia meeting and who will accompany the deputation and give their assistance to have the lakes kept at normal level. The chairman and secretary are sparing no effort to make the deputation a grand success. Messrs. Maloch and Robinson, with six men and a team, are hard at work removing the obstructions at the mouths of the outlets. They assure us that the obstructions in many places are fully six feet deep, and when removed will materially help to keep the lakes at their natural level.
