SOUTH VICTORIA.

The South Victoria appeal case comes up for hearing in Toronto Tuesday. The railway ticket business, the Farley letter and other subjects of interest a short time ago will be argued, as well as the \$10 paid out by Mr. Hugh O'Leary as agent for Mr. McIntyre for the purpose of bringing down voters from Haliburton in the interest of the Reform candidate. East Northumberland, Lennox, West York and Muskoka appeal cases will also be heard at the same time.

PREPARING HIMSELF.

Our friend Mr. S. S. Peck, of Dakota fame, appears to either be getting very much afraid as to his future position in the county of Haliburton, or he is beginning to lose faith in the hitherto surprising benignity and generosity of Mr. Mowat to such castaways as he, Mr. Fielding, and several others of a decidedly odorous reputation. For months past he would not live in Haliburton county, and expressed himself as "done with such a forsaken and poverty stricken country," except for the few days he was compelled to return and explain through the court to the benighted people the principles of mean and team, a point he was well able to instruct them, especially the mean part of it. Now, however, a change has come over the spirit of his dreams. He no longer seeks to shun the primitive people of Haliburton county; nay, he is all at once very anxious to come back and live amongst them and for that purpose arrived with his family from Dakota this week.

What is the cause of this sudden change of front, and why must the Dakota "estate" be allowed to run its chance for the winter? Because Mr. S. S. Peck fears the consequences of the petition sent recently to the Government by the people of Haliburton, and feels that his willingness to such that the crafty Mr. Mowat cannot defend him, even were he strong enough politically to do so. By bringing his family over from Dakota and residing for a few months in the county while Parliament is in session he hopes to stifle for a time at least this foreign cry of his opponents, and if possible once more draw the wool over the eyes of his political friends, as he has done many times before. But Mr. Peck tries this ruse too late in the day. The Haliburton people have taken him in hand, and however he may endeavor to meet them his old cunning can avail him little. Even supposing he could free himself from the charge of being a Yankee adventurer by pointing to his domicile at Minden he will not so easily show why he has never made good his defaulting escapade, nor why after vainly promising over his signature to raise the amount in instalments of \$400 annum he has so signally failed by anything.

It is not from this, Mr. Peck is under the advantage of being not the right man for an official for Haliburton in other respects, however much they may plead to the contrary. In the past he has been so unbecomingly familiar with the men who have held office for years here that it is very questionable if he could be found who has not been so familiar with them. They look upon

it merely as a favor to have such a man posing as a protector of truth and honesty, and naturally consider that before attempting through his official position to rule others in this regard he should at all events know enough to settle his own defects in the same line. And they think only as many others do not residing in the county of Haliburton. The spectacle of a man being the greatest scape-goat in the district and at the same time its highest official in the administration of justice is not edifying, and makes it plainly evident that there is a screw loose somewhere in the so-called christian principles of Mr. Oliver Mowat. As to Mr. Peck endeavoring to prepare himself for the opening of the Ontario Legislature by coming post haste to reside in Minden we have nothing to say; if he had not done so the only excuse his Government can trump up in its favor would be gone. But Mr. Peck must not stop here if he desires to clean his skirts and do better in future. There is the county delinquency to settle and many other little affairs of a financial nature that require his urgent attention, and which must be attended to ere he can feel sure that he is prepared to meet the petition sometime since sent to Mr. Mowat by the people of Haliburton, and a copy of which we publish next week.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

At Callander recently, it is said, that \$5,000 was paid for ten acres of land which twelve months ago could have been purchased for less than six dollars per acre.

Owing to ill-health the Hon. Jas. Young, who only recently accepted the Provincial trusteeship, has been obliged to resign. A. M. Ross, M. P. P., for West Huron, fills the vacancy.

At a bye election in Lewis, Quebec, last week the Conservative candidate was elected by a majority of over 800. The Liberal candidate failed to poll one-third of the votes cast, and therefore had to forfeit his \$200 deposit money. The Rathban Company, of Brockville, have secured a contract for furnishing about ten cars of manufactured wood material, being part of that required in the construction of a large hotel at Algoma Mills, on the Canada Pacific railroad. They have also made a contract for furnishing the material and erection of seven passenger stations with freight sheds and platforms along the line of the Ottawa and Quebec railroad.

No clue has been discovered as to the perpetrators of the London outrages nor as to the explosives used. Precautions are being taken to prevent a recurrence of similar crimes, and the Parliament and public buildings in London and other large towns are generally looked upon as the perpetrators. Russia, the New York fan, openly boasting of being cognate to the affair, and stating that similar events may be expected at any moment.

The question has cropped out at Belleville as to the propriety of going to church on Sunday by aid of a bicycle. Some gentlemen there appear to have drawn down displeasure on themselves by wheeling out to Shan-nonville, where they went to church and listened to a good sermon. If they had gone in a buggy not a word would have been said, but progress on the road by means of a bicycle, propelled by human legs, thus turning perpendicular into rotatory motion, is held up to censure. So it is that people chop straws.

About twenty years ago the Nipissing Railway Company laid a track along a portion of Esplanade street, Toronto, for their wood traffic. A short time since the track was pulled up, and the Midland Railway Company men commenced to re-lay it. The city engineer ordered the men to stop work, and the authorities were notified that the police would arrest any employee of the company found laying the track. The company claim that permission was originally granted by the city to lay the track, but no such record can be found.

The Mail thinks that Mr. Mowat should arrange his plans for the West Simcoe election forthwith. In the first place Brigadier Pattullo and his army should be ordered to the scene of the conflict. Stationed at Collingwood with full demijohns, these celebrities would do great execution and would defend that town from the determined attempts of the Norquay and the Mousseau to capture it. Specimens of vegetables and so forth to be shown at the next Toronto exhibition should be collected and paid for at once. It would also be well to endeavor to buy over two or three newspapers to support the Reform Government. A few colonization roads laid out in various directions might also help the cause of Liberalism.

An influential deputation from municipalities in counties of Ontario, York and Simcoe, interested in a scheme for lowering the water of Lake Simcoe, waited upon the Minister of Public Works Saturday afternoon, and asked that the Government take action to regulate the waters of the lake and fix a standard of water-mark. It appears that certain mill-owners, when the waters were low in the fall, instead of making arrangements for keeping the outlets clear and unobstructed, the channels thereby raising the waters of the lake, which overflowed in the spring, doing great damage to the property of the farmers on the lake shores. The Minister said he would give the matter his favorable consideration.

A writ has been issued at the instance of M. C. Gibbs, Ottawa, son of the late Senator Gibbs, against John Houston, manager of the Standard Bank, Cambridge, claiming \$50,000 damages for slander. The action is based upon the statements made by the defendant to a gentleman, holding that a note given by the plaintiff was so good and could not be renewed, and other damaging statements.

Some one should send our contemporary a dollar or two, so as to stop its incessant howl for money. Its leading editorial for weeks past has been to delinquents to pay up their dollar, and this it is eternally ringing into their ears notwithstanding the fact that the poor Mowat is in and the very critical political condition of Sir Richard Cartwright with respect to Lennox. But our Reform friends are certainly very good natured over it, although from the way their organ "goes for" them an outsider would suppose they are exceedingly slow pay. Perhaps they know that the \$50 and costs for libelling Mr. Rodden are about due, and knowing the fit the Post is in are disposed to be more lenient in consequence. Mr. McTavish was always fairly good in raising subscriptions, having raised one some time ago in "about twenty minutes," we commend our contemporary to him in this respect. A proportionate extension of time might even work this heart-rending case.

Reform papers are placing a great deal of importance upon the decisions of teachers' associations throughout the country on the subject of a Superintendent of Education v. a Minister of Education—that is, they place importance upon them when they favor the Minister. In West Middlesex the teachers' association met a little while ago. According to the report of the meeting there were twenty-six teachers present. When the vote was taken on the question of a Superintendent of Education instead of a Minister it stood this way: "In favor of the Superintendent, 63, in favor of the Minister, 105." How 168 teachers could have voted on the question when there were only twenty-six present is something very difficult to understand. Even if the entire teaching staff of the riding had been present it would only have furnished 110 votes. It is clear that the meetings are attended by others besides teachers, and that the decisions are not the decisions of the teachers alone.

Another party composed of Messrs. T. Magee and brother, Evans, English, Taylor, Hunter, McBrien and others, is also hunting there and is meeting with excellent success.

Campbell, lately missionary agent of the diocese of Huron, but now agent for this diocese. All those who are in any doubt as to the need for men and money to carry on the great missionary work both at home and abroad enjoined upon us by our blessed Saviour should make a point of hearing Mr. Campbell; his thorough knowledge of his subject gained by practical experience and his apt way of imparting that knowledge acquired by years spent in pleading the mission cause should give him a claim to our attention whatever our preconceived views of missions in general may have been. All strangers will be cordially welcomed. There will be collections both morning and evening on behalf of the mission fund of the diocese.
