The Dominion.
 New Westminister, B. C., wants connection with the C. P. C. The city council of that place lately offered the company a bonus if they would construct a branch to the city and begin the work at once.
 The trial of the petition against the return of Mr. Geo. Guillet, M. P., for West Northumberland, has again been postponed, this time indefinitely. The case in the case of the protest against Mr. Mulholland, M. P., for the same constituency, is likely to be re-acted when the trial takes place, if it ever does.
 The reports from all points in the lake region show that there was widespread damage by the storm on Sunday night and Monday. The loss of life was exceedingly small considering the number of disasters on the lakes. The keeper of the Colchester Reef light-ship was believed to be in danger, and a tug was sent to rescue him.
 Mr. R. Freeman, who has supervised the construction of the telephone line, has made connection with Kingston at Trenton, and in a few days communication direct will be established with Lindsay. Belleville is left in the cold because the council would not allow the company to erect poles where it most suited their convenience.
 President Stephen, of the Canada Pacific Railway, has issued a circular which states the Dominion Government has guaranteed a semi-annual dividend of one and a half per cent. on the stock of the company until the 17th of August, 1893, and that the company will supplement this guaranteed dividend by an additional one per cent. semi-annually during construction.
 A man named Dufoux, of Montreal, who was engaged to be married to Miss Gagnon at St. Bridget's church, did not keep his engagements, and the would-be bride and her friends had to return home disappointed. The father of the young lady subsequently interviewed the recalcitrant and threatened him with an action for breach of promise, whereupon the hero decamped to the States.
 Some time ago the Ontario Government refused to grant money for the construction of a road between Oliver and the Kabavaka Falls, on the Kaministiquia, on the ground that the road could not be a colonization road, the country around it being totally unfit for settlement. When the Algoma election came along the construction of the road was decided upon, and now that the clouds in the political atmosphere will hang heavily over the district, the work on the road is said to be in progress.
 One of the signs favorable to the removal of Victoria college to Toronto is the guarded way in which the Aote Victorians discussed its last number the future of the college. Certainly from the student's standpoint there is everything to be gained from coming to Toronto: a better training, a larger field, a more varied student life, better professors, more experience, a wider

grasp. Everything about Victoria worth preserving can be translated to Toronto, and many new and valuable adjuncts can be secured.
 The Halifax Presbyterian Witness estimates the population of Newfoundland as follows by religions:—Roman Catholics, 64,317; Episcopalians, 59,561; Methodists, 38,702; Presbyterians, 1,168; Congregationalists, 561; Baptists, etc., 168.
 The Marine Department, at Ottawa, having learned that three sailors had died in Quebec hospital, immediately sent orders to have their remains decently interred, as otherwise, under a local law, they would have been handed over for dissection.
 A gloom has been cast over the village of Clarksburgh, Grey county, by the sudden death of Thomas Longbeed, carpenter and builder, who, at the raising of the frame of the new foundry building there, was instantly killed by the falling of one of the beams.
 Simon Grievs fell from a house on which he was working in Rockwood, on Friday last. It was found that several of his ribs were broken, his collar bone broken, besides sustaining internal injuries. He was taken to Duffield's hotel, in the village, and died on Monday.
 A meeting of influential citizens was held in Montreal on Friday to arrange for the winter carnival and ice palace, at which the various committees were appointed. Half of the required amount has been already subscribed, and a brilliant success is thus early assured.
 Early Thursday morning a farmer named Reuben Lyburner, living near Duville, Ont., committed suicide by hanging in his brother's barn. He has been considered insane for some time, but was regarded as perfectly harmless. He had arrayed himself in his best clothes.
 A Toronto man reports seeing a swallow on his place on Thursday morning. As far as he knows the appearance of this bird so late in the season is unprecedented. What have the weather prophets to say about it? How many other "swallows" preceded the swallow in question?
 The Toronto board of trade has resolved to present a memorial to the Government asking for certain desired changes in the Customs act. They also signed a petition prepared by the Land Law Amendment Association, praying the Local Government to take the necessary measures at the next session of the Legislature for the adoption of the Torrens land system.
 It is stated upon the authority of a temperance organ, the Hamilton Tribune, that the Dominion alliance's receipts from "temperance Sunday," upon which all the ministers in Ontario were asked to preach a temperance sermon and take up a collection for the benefit of the alliance's funds, have been three dollars, while the alliance's expenses in connection therewith for postage, etc., amounted to forty dollars.
