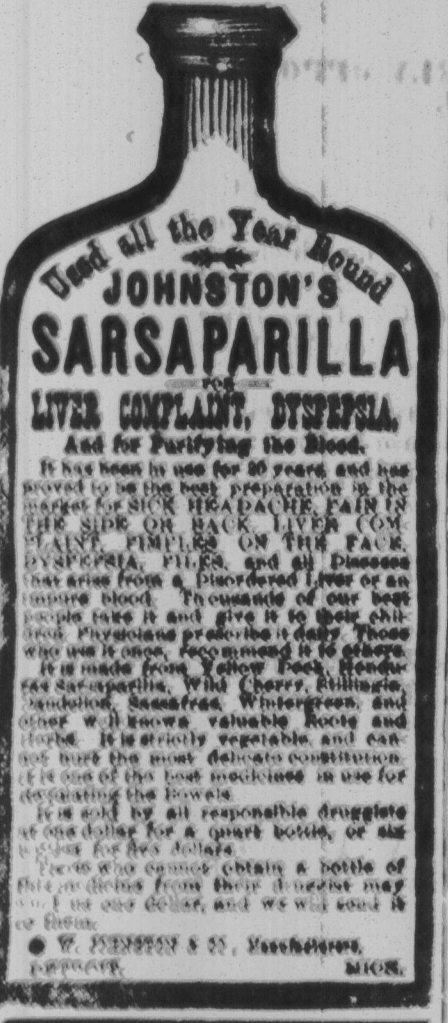

Notes and Comments.

It has been estimated that 55 lives and 60 vessels were lost by the series of gales on the lakes from November 11th to November 17th, the vessels lost aggregating in value to \$400,000.

The price paid by the Grip Company to the Globe Printing Company for the latter's job room is \$31,500. All the Globe men will be employed by the new management, and left the Globe office on Friday night.

A young man named Eugene St. Charles was arrested the other night in Montreal for firing three shots out of a revolver at a scoundrel who took liberties with a young girl and then made off. No prosecutor appearing in court the prisoner was released.

Two prisoners of Sandwich goal, named Phipps and Greenwood, escaped the other day by cutting the bars of their cell window. Both were incarcerated for murder. They were seen in Detroit the same night. Large rewards are offered for their detection.

A small army of navies on their way to Algoma Mills besieged the mayor of Collingwood for rations the other day. The mayor, however, rose equal to the occasion and threatened their bosses that if they did not feed the men he would ship them back to Toronto.

At the Hamilton police court, on Saturday, a small boy named C. H. Oweley was fined \$10 and costs on complaint of the Salvation Army that he had thrown mud and stones at the procession. A good deal of indignation is expressed at the severity of the sentence.

The step father of a young girl only eighteen years of age, who was seduced by a married man in Montreal named Telephore Painchaud, was fined \$20 for thrashing the scoundrel within an inch of his life. Rather hard lines, people think, under the painful circumstances.

Mr. A. S. Cruikshank, headmaster at Hess street school, Hamilton, was up at the police court on the charge of unmercifully flogging a twelve year old boy named Ashley. It was proven that the boy had been insubordinate, and it was not shown that he had been brutally beaten. The magistrate dismissed the case, remarking that the headmaster had done perfectly right.

An influential deputation of ladies and gentlemen waited upon Attorney General Mowat in Toronto, and urged upon him the necessity of the Government granting additional aid to the House of Industry, to enable that institution to keep the pauper Irish immigrants, about 60 families, representing 400 or 500 souls, from starvation. The action of the Home Government in sending such immigrants was strongly deprecated, and Mr. Mowat was asked to write them on the subject. Mr. Mowat stated that he would consider the matter and see what could be done.

The Mail says: "The great cry and little wool policy of the Opposition was never more clearly exhibited than in the notice they have made about the cotton factories. There are twenty-one cotton factories in the Dominion. Of these, two suspended operations for a time, four worked three-quarter time, and one worked over time. The rest pursued the even tenor of their way. Of those which either stopped or lessened production, two have gone on again, and the rest will follow suit forthwith." The simple fact is, that the cotton production of the country this year will be about two and a half times as great as in 1876, and the number of persons employed about in that proportion.

While the wages paid out will be about three times as great. That tells the whole story.

Every one is agreed that the Salvation Army has met with wonderful success at Stroud. All the young men have joined the army. Their place of meeting is crowded until there is no standing room, and a large number of people from other places have had to go away for want of room.

The Allen line steamer, Peruvian, on Saturday, 24th ult., was the last of the Allen line mail steamers via the St. Lawrence this year. After this the mail steamers will sail from Portland every Thursday and will call at Halifax every Saturday for the passengers and mails.

The whole family of Judge Plamondon, Montreal, became sick with symptoms of poisoning. An investigation revealed that the mischief had been caused by the hot air furnace. The reservoir of water in it, used to purify the air, had become rotten and emitted a most dangerous and poisonous gas.

A man named Frank Meyers a few weeks ago deserted his wife and family of five small children, in the township of Macmillan, and eloped to the other side with a young girl from Glenora. Before leaving Meyers sold his farm, stock and implements, receiving the cash for them. He took the whole with his wife, leaving his delicate wife and infants quite penniless. They have been provided for by the neighbors for the present.

The Manitoba chief of police Creighton has not yet been landed over by the Grit authorities. It is also said by those who should know that the carpet-baggers, acting under instructions from Mr. Mowat, have decided to send Creighton to Winnipeg. In that case the Grit authorities will be asked to show cause why Creighton was arrested, and if they are unable to do so, judgment and costs will go against them. The Government are making extensive preparations to go into the case in a most elaborate manner. Maps of the territory, the evidence taken on the award, and all matters that can be secured from the time of George IV. and up, and which bears on the disputed territory, are being collected with the intention to go into the boundary question, and the case, if not settled here, will be taken to the Supreme Court at Ottawa, and if no satisfactory conclusion be arrived at there it will be carried to the Privy Council. The intention is to take Creighton along, and leave no stone unturned to arrive at a settlement of the question.

The captain of the British bark Avon, which recently arrived at Valparaiso, reports that when in lat. 38 deg. 58 min. south and long. 46 deg. 14 min. west he sighted a ship which seemed to be lying over on the port side some three miles distant. He made toward it, and passing at half a cable's length from it on the easterly side he saw that it was the remains of two vessels which occupied a position like the shape of the letter T. The one on the north was lying from northwest to southwest, and was the after-part of a newly coppered vessel floating bottom up, with sides painted black. That on the south side was lying in the direction of east to west, and seemed to have been the side of a ship of 800 to 900 tons, painted green on the lower part and black on the top. Seeing the other wreckage at a distance of two and a half miles in a south-easterly direction he made toward it, and found it to be part of a third vessel, bottom up, coppered, with the bows pointing south-east. The stern was sheathed in zinc.
