HALIBURTON.

Last week there was a meeting of the nunicipal council, when Mr. Niven, Mr. Young and Mr. Dover, the committee appointed at the recent public meeting attended to press on the council the ad visability of not levying more than three cents on the dollar of assessment. The council, having heard the committee, declined to make any alteration in the rate levied. The present rate levied is nearly four and a half cents on the dollar, which it is contended by some is more than the council has any power to levy legally. In answer to this it is said that the council levy only two cents for municipal purposes and that the balance is levied by the county council. Be tween them there is room for a very nice legal squabble. It is also understood that the law courts have issued an interim injunction restraining the sheriff from municipality. This will still further complicate affairs, and a way out of the muddle is not easy to discover.
