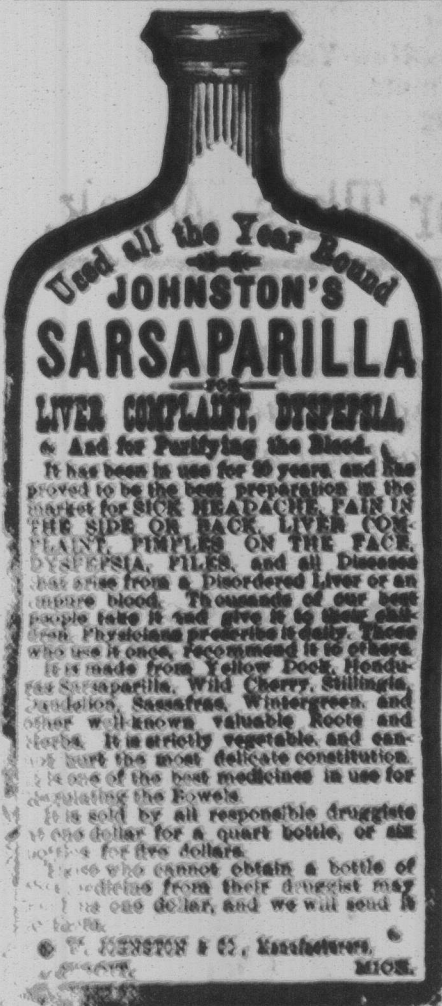

Notes and Comments.

The investigation into the defalcations connected with the Montreal civic treasury hold that no proper check was placed on the peculating official, and that the defalcations were hushed up until long after they were first discovered.

Dr. McEwen, of the Department of Agriculture, states that the reported cholera among hogs has been very much magnified, being confined to a very few animals. There has been no spread of the disease, and consequently no necessity for proclaiming the district infected.

The Ontario educational authorities would do well to take notice of a judicious reform in the Indiana university, which has abolished the study of Greek and Latin in order that more time may be paid to the study of agriculture and horticulture. These studies have been too much neglected in our public school system.

The rulers of the society of Friends in England have just issued a revised edition of the Quaker regulations to the members of their bodies. Such "foolish and wicked pastimes" as "balls, gaming places, horse races and play-houses" are strongly denounced; but "needful recreation" is prescribed as "a duty." Music is now permitted, but "musical entertainments" are still forbidden.

A female teacher in Michigan took four of her pupils to a billiard saloon to show them a game in progress, on the excuse of giving them an object lesson. The board objected and suspended the eccentric young lady, deeming it probable that such experiments might extend to the drinking and smoking usages next. As it appears, however, that the error has been atoned for, there is a petition for her reinstatement.

The storm which visited England last week did an immense amount of damage to property and caused great loss of life. The record of calamities for the year has been very great, and it seems that as civilization extends the perils to human life become greater. A recent writer points out with originality that a great storm on the coast has always heralded a crisis in Ireland. As there has been a crisis in Ireland for hundreds of years, Ireland must have suffered a condensed deluge. Whether the late storm means a new wrinkle in the crisis business in that unhappy land remains to be seen, or perhaps is pointed out the O'Donnell crisis.

Manitoba's authorities having ascertained that in their dry atmosphere cold is not more severely felt at 36 deg. below zero than it is at zero in the humid air of Great Britain, and that building operations are carried on all winter in Manitoba, a writer in the Kansas City Times says: "The thermometer at 2 deg. below freezing point in England causes far more discomfort than when it is 62 deg. below in Manitoba; and in fact the lower the thermometer goes the less is the cold felt, owing to the extraordinary quantity of oxygen in the air. It is no uncommon sight in Manitoba, when the mercury registers 50 or 60 deg. below zero, to see settlers walking about in bare feet and with shirt sleeves rolled up, enjoying to the fullest extent the scene in the atmosphere, and instead of building operations being suspended in winter it is a remarkable fact that as the cold increases building work increases and the mortar becomes so plastic as to render it a work of considerable difficulty for the bricklayers to spread it properly. In December and January, when the day's ploughing is finished, the settlers are constantly in the habit

of letting the fire go out in the evening while they sit out on the porches in the warm winter moonlight and listen to the delightful warbling of the nightingale in the neighboring woods. This beats the fish story.

The Ontario cabinet is now made up of members for the counties of Lambton, (Pardee) Huron, (Ross) Middlesex, (Ross) Oxford, (Mowat) Brant (Hardy) and Brockville (Fraser). Mr. Mowat is the only Toronto man and Mr. Fraser the only eastern man. Five of them are lawyers.

A girl named Kate Maloney, of Millvale, N. E., who seemed very melancholy and was reported insane at times, recently wandered into the woods, where she remained for twenty-one days without food of any kind except the gum she ate from the trees. When found her feet were very badly frozen. One of them will have to be amputated and she will probably lose part of the other.

Another has been added to the long list of disasters on the upper lakes, the steam barge Enterprise having gone to the bottom with seven of her crew. From the statement of the survivors it appears the vessel "opened in two" before disappearing beneath the waves. If ever there was a Plimsoll wanted anywhere it is on the upper lakes as one half of the vessels which ply these waters are totally unfit to trust men's lives in. Of this one would think the Governments of Canada and the United States, and the people of both countries have had ample proofs, but save for the comments of the press when such disasters occur, no steps are taken to mitigate the evil of permitting unseaworthy crafts carrying valuable lives on board to boldly court destruction on the waters of the Georgian bay and lake Superior.

On Wednesday last P. C. Hind left Kingston for Buck lake, he having been sent for to help to capture a man named Bingham Hunt, who attempted to shoot Henry Ainsley, Jr., a farmer residing at that place, on the 3rd inst. On arriving at Buck lake he found that the man he wanted had left for Michigan a week previous. The policeman says that Buck lake and vicinity is a hard place. At Lyndhurst there is a gang of rough characters encamped, and their principal vocation is shooting and stealing from farmers. They are of the Jesse James stamp. Travelers who pass the camp have to shell out their money or risk losing their lives. They stopped a man some time ago and robbed him of everything he possessed including a bottle of whiskey. Whenever they have a case on hand they mark themselves by wearing false whiskers. Hunt was one of this gang. The gang referred to above decamped soon after P. C. Hind's arrival in that vicinity. It is thought the thief that stole the horse and buggy at Brockville some time ago was one of the gang.

There is no word yet of the criminals who escaped from Sandwich jail although there is a reward of two hundred and fifty dollars each offered for their re-capture; or rather for the recapture of two of them, Phipps and Greenwood, the third having been confined for a minor offence, and having only a short time to serve. Greenwood's sentence has been commuted by the Minister of Justice to imprisonment for life, but it is hardly likely that even this act of clemency will have the effect of inducing Greenwood to return and serve out his sentence. It appears that the fact that the attempt to escape would be made was known to all the prisoners confined in the same wing of the jail, but none of the turnkeys heard of this till the escape was effected. It is also known that there were confederates outside and that the tools used to effect the escape were conveyed into the jail by surreptitious means. The sheriff of Sandwich does not seem to have given himself much uneasiness about the escape, but to have sat with folded hands, waiting for the Government to offer a reward.
