LOCAL JOTTINGS.

URBAN AND SUBURBAN.

A PRIZE fight on a large scale was talked of near the market yesterday to come off Christmas day, to be fought according to the Marquis of Queensbury rules.
TIMES have been rather more busy in the police court department this week. The cases were, however, mostly for disorderly conduct on the street and other venial offences, resulting merely in light fines.
THE claim that if women were allowed the ballot only the best men would be selected for office is a proposition which should be received, says an exchange, with many grains of allowance. If their judgment is so infallible it is strange they make so many mistakes in selecting husbands.
GORE—An employe of the freight department of the Midland here, named Lashary, departed last week owing considerable money in small amounts to the business men. He is said to have resided formerly in Kimmount, and came here some time last spring to take charge of the stores at Lindsay. He is supposed to have gone to England.
We learn that notice has been given by the Midland railway authorities to about twenty employes of that company at Toronto that their services will not be required after the end of the year. Such reductions will be likely to arise from the amalgamation of the roads, and it is to be feared that Lindsay will come in for its share of the reductions that will be made.
A SPECIAL general meeting of the shareholders of the Midland Railway of Canada was held at Peterboro Thursday afternoon. The meeting was a private one, and the reporters were not admitted. One ambitious quill-driver sought admittance, but it was refused him. There was a small attendance of shareholders, and the agreement with the Grand Trunk railway providing for the operation of the lines of the Midland by the Grand Trunk Company and securing out of the gross revenue of the Midland railway the interest upon the mortgage debt of the Midland, with a contingent interest in the earnings to the shareholders of the Midland Company was approved of.

MR. J. J. Irwin, who has been for some time in the Dominions organ and piano agency with Mr. W. W. Logan, has removed to Peterboro and will manage the agency there. He has already entered on the business in Mr. W. J. Green's store and reports doing well.
THROUGH the urgent request of many of the electors of the south ward, Mr. Robt. Payne, who for so many years has stood aloof from municipal affairs against the wishes of many of his friends, has consented to become a candidate for 1884. He will make a good councillor, and will be a decided acquisition to our municipal legislators.
ACCIDENT.—Monday night a brakeman on the Midland railway named George Tomlinson was severely injured at Unionville station. He was employed on a wood train and in attempting to jump aboard as the cars were moving out from the station, fell into a catwalk and his left hand dropped on the rail. The wheel of the car struck it and jammed it terribly, but did not run over it. The man had an extraordinary escape from being killed.
THE Mail publishes the following paragraph on what authority we do not know.—"On the first of the year the Grand Trunk will take over the Midland railway completely and operate it most likely from Toronto instead of from Peterboro. The Grand Trunk has been in virtual control for months, but now proposed to do away with the independent organization of the Midland. The car shops, etc., will remain at Peterboro, in accordance with a former agreement between the Midland and that town."
VICTORIA v. PETERBORO.—On Thursday Mr. Hensley, Q. C., appeared on behalf of the defendants, the county of Victoria, from the judgment of Wilson, C. J., granting an injunction, Robinson, Q. C., and J. C. G. C. for the plaintiffs, the county of Peterboro, showed cause. The injunction restrains the county of Victoria from proceeding with an arbitration to fix the amount payable by the plaintiffs as their contribution to the expense of a bridge which is made by and over the county of Victoria. Appeal dismissed. Costs reserved.
ALL sorts of ingenious devices for entertaining people, and getting money, are invented. Among the latest developments in this direction is to have a light and pleasing musical or literary programme, and then to have a lunch, which is provided in this way.—Each lady prepares a basket of lunch or two, and puts her card in it. These baskets are then sold to the highest bidder, and the gentlemen who are purchasing take the lunch with the lady whose card he finds in the basket. Some results of an amusing character are sometimes observed. This kind of social is similar to the necktie and apron socials, but is of an improved plan.
MR. M. Deane, who last week returned from the west, gives interesting accounts of life and customs in the Northwest. During his two years residence in that country he has seen a great deal and travelled more, and his own personal adventures of one kind and another would fill a volume. He met several from Lindsay in his travels in Montana, Edmonton, amongst whom were Mr. McKay, formerly a dry goods merchant in the store now occupied by Mr. Markham; Rev. Dr. Newton, formerly of Lindsay, but for the past eight or nine years the church of England missionary there; Tom Kaiser, and several others. Mr. McKay has good farms, and some houses, and will yet build more. He is also owner with his brother of a rich coal mine, and has already begun mining. He is evidently doing well. Dr. Newton has five or six farms as there is in the country, and a house or two, but his main efforts are put forth to finish and get out of debt a new English church recently erected there, and the only one for many hundred miles around. Mr. Deane is a surveyor of wide experience, and when he says it is a splendid country there can be no discount on it.
FIRE.—We appear to have had an epidemic of fires this week, but fortunately all were of little consequence. On Friday afternoon during the high wind the establishment known as Anthony Cleas' residence succumbed to the flames in short order. This place had been visited by the police a night or two before, when the "sailed doves" and others were provided with more suitable quarters. There was therefore no one in the house at the time and the fire remains a mystery. The same evening another fire alarm was sounded and it was found to be the stable this time, which had managed to escape earlier in the evening. Of course no one knew anything about this either. Early Monday morning the shed of Mrs. McLeas was discovered in flames, but was subdued, then followed the stable and shed of Mr. Graham in the east ward. In the morning Mrs. McLeas' stable was destroyed and considerable difficulty was experienced in saving the house. Finally Mr. J. Filkie's stable was found to have been started but failed to burn. Incendiarism is evident in nearly all the cases, but so far no proof has been brought home to any one. The police are, however, on the lookout for some parties they appeared to have some suspicion about. They have also three young lads under arrest on suspicion, but nothing is known definitely concerning them.
