NORTH VICTORIA.

The North Victoria election case, a full report of which will be found elsewhere, is not to be definitely decided till Tuesday next.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

Municipal candidates have now got themselves into shape and the public will be enabled to come to some choice. The mayoralty for 1884 remains as before, but for reeve Mr. R. Leary will contest the reeve ship with Col. Deacon and bid fair to give him a close run.

NEW MAP.

Col. Deacon moved, seconded by Mr. Crandell, that the clerk be instructed to have a new map of the town prepared, such map to contain all the subdivisions of lots and to show on the face of each the area of such lot or sub-division of lot, with such further references as may be required to facilitate the necessary assessments.—Carried.

RAILWAY MATTERS.

Mr. Crandell moved, seconded by Col. Deacon, that the speeches of certain members of the Government of Ontario and the promoters of the Victoria railway and others, on the subject of said road, as read at the late public meeting held in this town, together with such other matter or documents who drew up the report regarding the said road, as lately published in the Lindsay newspapers, be printed and circulated among the members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario and for the information of such as desire to aid and co-operate in order that the wrong done to this town in connection with the bonus given by it for the said road may be redressed.—Carried.

REPORTS.

Col. Deacon presented the report of the finance committee and the addition of Mr. Wood's account of \$36.30 and adopted.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Moved by Mr. Winters, seconded by Mr. McEwen, the complaint of Mr. Thos. Adams in regard to an error in his taxes was referred to the finance committee.—Carried.

It. With, we think, one exception, all the roads built by bonuses in this province have passed into the hands of either one or the other of the great monopolies—the Grand Trunk or the Canadian Pacific—and the people who built them have no control over them.

On Tuesday the Midland Railway of Canada passed away and now has become the Midland division of the Grand Trunk Railway. General manager Nicholson of the Grand Trunk has issued a general order dated December 20th, giving a great deal of information with reference to the arrangements of the road so far as the officers are concerned.

Mr. Arthur White, the permanent traffic manager, will continue to have charge of all traffic matters connected with the division with the title of traffic manager. Mr. J. G. MacNeil, the present engineer of the Midland line, will continue in charge, communicating with and reporting to Mr. Hannaford, chief engineer of the Grand Trunk at Montreal, upon matters connected with this department.

Mr. J. D. Burnett, the mechanical superintendent, and Mr. W. R. Ferguson, superintendent, will also continue in their different capacities, communicating with Mr. Waters and Mr. Speer, of Montreal, respectively. The headquarters of the officers of the Midland division will be at Peterboro, with the exception of the mechanical and car department, which will remain at Port Hope.

TOWN COUNCIL.

MORE RAILWAY BUSINESS—OLD SPEECHES TO BE MADE NEW—THE COUNCIL "AWFULLY" INDUSTRIOUS.

The town council met Friday evening pursuant to adjournment. The following gentlemen were present: The mayor and Messrs. Deacon, Crandell, Sinclair, Cahill, Ingle, Castro and Connelly.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A communication from Jessie McEwen, secretary of women's suffrage association, asking the council to petition the Ontario Legislature in regard to political and municipal franchise to women was read by the clerk.

PEITITIONS.

Col. Deacon moved, seconded by Mr. Crandell, that petitions to his honor the Lieutenant Governor in council and to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario in Parliament assembled praying that the Province may assume, for reasons therein set forth, the sum of \$25,000, granted by way of bonus by the town of Lindsay to the Victoria railway, or that the said Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario will take such means as may release the town of Lindsay from further payments in that respect be now received and read a first time.—Carried.

Mr. Crandell moved, seconded by Mr. Cahill, that as a misunderstanding has arisen as to the right of the band to occupy the public market that this council grant permission to the band to occupy the police court for the purpose of their practice until notified to the contrary and that they shall keep the same clean and orderly.—Carried. The council then adjourned.
