THE INDIAN QUESTION. The progress of the Indians in Manitoba and the North-west during last year has been, on the whole, satisfactory. The bands included in the several Indian territories have, for the most part, betaken themselves to their reserves, and a bill for the further promotion of their interests will be sugmitted to you, as well as a measure applicable to the whole Dominion, for the purpose of encouraging the more advanced Indian communities to assume the responsibilities of self-government.

CONCERNING BLECTORAL PRANCEISE. The Bill laid before you last session for the representation of the people in parliament, and the assimilation of the electoral transhines existing in several previous has now been before the country for a year. The measure will be re-introduced and I commend it to your attention.

PROTECTION OF WORKINGMEN. I would also arge upon you the ex-pediency of providing for the regula-tion of metery labor and the protec-tion of the workingman and his family. The measure submitted last session, with some amendments, will be laid selore you.
