OPENING CEREMONIES.

The second session of the fifth parliament of Canada is now sitting. The usual opening formalities were attended with increased interest, as the address from the throne was read for the first time by the new governor general, the Marquis of Lansdown, who seems to have made a very favorable impression on those who had the honor of being present.

THE ADDRESS.
