The family of the absconding Montreal produce exporter, T. H. Hodgins, have made an offer to compromise with the Hocheleg and Moisons bank for forty cents on the dollar.

The withdrawal of the Kingston branch of the S. & Q. from the present place is considered probable, on account of inability to come to an agreement on matters in difference between them.

The Limestone City is excited over the discovery of talpines in the water supplied to the citizens. The manager, however, stoutly maintains that Kingston water is the second best in the Dominion.

Two Kingston boys, thirteen years of age, who left the Limestone City a few days ago to seek their fortunes, having been inspired by the proposal of "Peck's Bad Boy," have had their youthful aspirations snipped in the bud by being arrested in Oswego for vagrancy.

A writ has been issued against the Mail Printing Company and its manager, C. W. Hunting, for \$100,000 damages for an alleged libel, contained in the Montreal correspondence of that paper on Monday last, reflecting on the Belt and Iron Co. of Montreal, and of its president and manager, Mr. John Livingston, in connection with the latter Exchange bank, the late manager of which is a brother-in-law of Mr. Livingston.

A number of Ulster magistrates wish to become martyrs after the manner of Lord Rosemore. For instance Sir John Leslie wrote to the government asking why his commission as justice of the peace was not withdrawn, since he had accompanied Lord Rosemore in that gentleman's warlike expedition to Rosemore. The Collingwood Enterprise states that Owen Sound is to be made the Ontario terminus of the Canada Pacific railway system.

The Marquis de Lorne has presented the Queen a silver battery with a prize for general efficiency.

A train ran off the track about two miles from Stratford, and several passengers were injured.

Conductor Barber, tried for manslaughter in connection with the Humber disaster, has been discharged.

Henry Thomas, coloured, was arrested at Windsor for robbing and shooting with intent to kill his wife.

The ten mile skating race at New York for the championship of America was won by Axel Paulsen, a Norwegian.

According to the Government returns the number of immigrants who settled in Canada in 1883 was 110,284.

Two boys aged 14 and 16, of Leduc, Pa., enticed a small boy into an out-of-the-way place and murdered him.

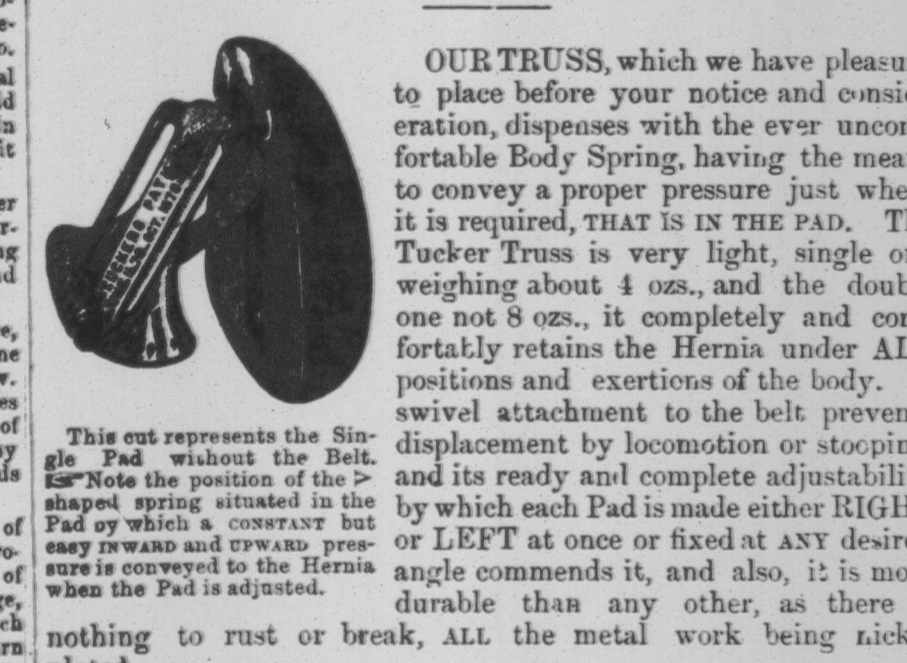
