Total surplus \$9,785,498

Which cannot fail to be satisfactory, more particularly when it is borne in mind that losses to the following amount and on the articles named have been remitted:

Reduction on Tax duties \$944,016

On Coffee 76,813

On Tea 1,716

On Bill stamps 200,000

On Postage on newspapers 50,000

On Tobacco duty 700,000

On Soap 1,000

On Perfumery 14,000

On Wine, etc. 20,000

Total \$2,087,048

This proves most conclusively what was so often and emphatically denied by our opponents that the present policy can at some time bring both revenue and protection, for after a reduction of \$20,000,000, mostly on articles of necessity, we have a surplus of \$7,000,000 to apply to public works and reduction of debt.

The estimated expenditure for the current year is \$31,000,000 and estimated receipts \$32,000,000, which will leave a surplus of \$1,000,000 to which may be added proceeds of sale of lands in the North-west, \$1,000,000.

It is expected that such a surplus year the receipts from customs will decline, for as our home manufacturers increase our imports must proportionately fall off.

Sir Leonard in a speech of three hours pointed out the advantages of the present system, and replied to objections most frequently urged against it, indeed of the truth we know. I think there are few in the House who have the interest of the country at heart who do not approve of the policy as applied to our position.

Sir Richard Cartwright replied. Now no one doubts Sir Richards great ability and his competence to deal with large financial transactions, but I venture to say that in his reply he disappointed most of his friends.
