Good Friday passed off with the usual quietness. Services were held in most of the churches and all the stores were closed. The band, the parade of the Salvation Army and the fire in the evening were the chief incidents of the day.
The season for trapping and shooting musk rats opened on the 1st of this month, and the local sports have succeeded in capturing quite a number of them. They are quite plentiful around the lake, though it is a little early yet for them to make their appearance in full force.
The town councillors are deserving of credit for their manifest desire for assisting Mr. Sylvester in enlarging his manufactory so far as they believe the town finances will permit. His works are so crowded now with orders that it is with the greatest difficulty he can furnish room for men to work in filling them and we have reason to believe that the demand for his ploughs is so large that not a sufficient number of men can work on them. If the drill shed is remedied he desires he intends putting up a building even larger than the one he now considers his chief building, which will give employment to more than double the number of men now engaged.
