Two sports were fined \$5 and costs each at Bowmanville a few days ago for shooting long-eared game contrary to law.

The Belleville school trustees have decided to petition the Department of Education to authorize the introduction of a temperance textbook into the schools.

The Bracebridge council has offered a reward of one hundred dollars for the discovery of the party or parties that set fire to the British Lion hotel a couple of weeks ago.

A Toronto lady proposes to teach working girls book-keeping. Young girls now look with more favor upon household service.

The Millbrook party of colonists who were in the railway collision at St. Paul have arrived at their destination on the South Antler, Man.

There has been issued by the Ontario crown lands department a pamphlet of some seventy pages, descriptive of the Algoma district.

A cow's accident furnished an attraction to quite a number on Sunday morning last as the people were coming from church at Uxbridge.

Mr. C. Wilnot, of the Newcastle fish hatchery, has distributed 500,000 whitefish in the waters of Lake Ontario.

Mrs. Lillian Shears, of 40 summer, according to a press despatch is bringing an action against one Storey, of Cavan township, for breach of promise of marriage.

Roy Barnett, a little boy three years of age, of Fort Hope, while playing, last week fell into a vat of hot water, and was so badly scalded that he died three days after.

Mrs. M. Winn, of North York, died recently at the advanced age of 88. She was one of the pioneer settlers having emigrated to that county from Vermont in 1817.

Mr. J. H. Buck, manager of the Georgian Bay Lumber Company, at Byng Inlet, lost a valuable team of horses by drowning in the lake about twenty miles from the inlet last week.

Mr. Henry McKay, of Ops, says stock raising pays. During the last two years he has sold \$1,400 worth of horses, cattle and sheep off 100 acres of land and kept up his share of grain raising.

A terrible disaster occurred near Port Arthur on the railroad in course of construction last week by which six men were killed and several injured more or less seriously. The fatality was caused by the premature explosion of a blast.

J. F. Seward, a butcher of Collingwood, was last week put in Barrie jail on suspicion of having broken the front window of a liquor store and carried off about \$20 worth of liquors.

The Government surveying parties are preparing for work in the Northwest. Half a dozen surveys from Toronto and one from Oakville have started for Battleford.

A farmer who haits from Markham arrived in the city of Bradford lately and told a pitiful story of being swindled on the train going from Toronto there. A stranger made himself very agreeable, and when one of the small stations was reached asked the honest son of the soil to advance him money on a cheque, as he would be unable to cash it in the village.

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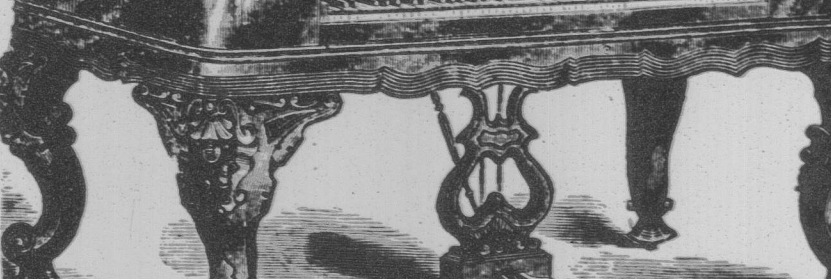
