An enterprising farmer of the county of Brant has been experimenting in feeding wheat to his hogs and he found that by feeding one dollar's worth of wheat to certain hogs he realized two dollars worth of eggs. This year he has tried it on a larger scale and finds that after feeding four dollars in wheat he realized fourteen dollars in the number of eggs laid. He is firmly convinced that it is profitable, and that wheat is a number one egg producer.

The Inspector thereupon is required to notify all the holders of licenses, forbidding them under penalties to supply liquor to such individuals. The clause has already been taken advantage of, and will prove of service in keeping liquor to a large extent from those who cannot control their appetites.

#### Railway Notes.

Circulars have been issued to the officers and employes of different systems, notifying them that on and after the 1st the Ontario & Quebec Railway, with leased lines—Credit Valley, etc., at Toronto, Grey & Bruce—will be operated as the Ontario division of the C. E. R. Mr. W. Whyte being general superintendent.

The work of constructing the telegraph line between Peterborough and Toronto has been commenced and the posts are now put up for a distance of about six miles west of the town. A new boarding house (or wheels) has been started for men engaged on this work. Mr. S. Wright is superintendent of the construction of the telegraph line and Mr. W. N. Cronk is foreman.

The last spike of the Ontario and Quebec railway was driven Monday afternoon by Hugh Ryan (superintendent of construction) at a point five miles east of Agincourt. Mr. Harrison, contractor for laying the rails on the Peterboro end, also drove a spike. Trains can now be run through to Ottawa. In two weeks more regular freight trains will be despatched, and in four weeks passengers ought to be sent through. Then the Canadian Pacific will be a realized fact so far as this province is concerned. About 110 miles of telegraph have yet to be built, but four gangs are in the field building five miles a day, and this rate is to be increased.

When the formal opening of the road will take place is not yet known but it will be a gala day. On May 24 a large party of Peterboro merchants are to be brought into Toronto.

#### Young Men's Lib. Association.

The usual Young Men's Association meeting was held on Thursday evening and was fairly well attended as any other legislative body usually is. On the occasion Mr. Stewart occupied the chair and filled it amply in every way desired. The first part of the evening was taken up with an elaborate essay on the coming presidential election in the United States by Mr. Dunn, who in the most convincing manner showed up the evils of the system under which the president of the United States is elected. He further gave the American some splendid advice, which no doubt they will be ready to take advantage and bless the name of Dunn at the close of the next election.

It is unnecessary for us to state that after such convincing proofs there was not the least doubt in the mind of any one and in the general discussion which followed it was solemnly resolved that there must be something wrong. The propriety of sending a deputation from the society to "commune" with President Arthur, to consider the matter was also hinted at, but an expressive wink from the secretary, who knew the state of the treasury, was sufficient to dispel the idea, and it was agreed to mail the poor President a copy of this week's Warder instead, of which some one said two copies could be got for five cents. Mr. T. B. Dean then read an essay on "Paupers, their present use and future mission," which showed industry on his part and a fund of knowledge on the subject that would almost lead one to suppose that at some remote period of his life he belonged to the printing fraternity.
