FENELON FALLS.

PRESENTATION.—Mr. Reuben Herring, who last week left the employ of the Spence Paper Co. in this village, was presented by his fellow workmen, on the eve of his departure, with a handsome set of glassware, as a slight token of their friendship and esteem.

NOT FOUND YET.—The body of Joseph Anthony, the Frenchman who last week jumped from the bridge in this village, has not yet been found. It probably rose the ninth day, but the water was so rough in consequence of a high wind that no one liked to go on the river, and we believe no search was made.

POWER POWER.—For a long time past the gradual increase of business in Smith & Eddy's shingle mill has rendered more power desirable, and they have just put in a much larger engine than the old one, which, though it did the work, was evidently overtaxed.

ALMOST A FIRE.—About midnight last Sunday a barrel outside a lean-to at the rear of the Simpson House caught fire from some hot ashes deposited there, and the back of the shed was quickly consumed in a blaze. Fortunately it was observed in time by Mr. James Marshall, who had come to attend to his livery, and Mr. Robert Menzies, caretaker at the mill, who reached the spot almost simultaneously, and put out the flames with a few pails of water.

BUSINESS NOTES.—Several of the parties burned out at the late fire have already resumed business, and all the others expect Mr. Manning will do so as soon as possible. Mr. Moore is located in one of Mr. Jordan's new stores, and the other (which has just undergone long division) has been rented by Mr. S. Newison and Mr. W. W. Blott. Mr. L. Laliberte, bootmaker, is up above them, and his brother, Mr. A. Laliberte, tailor, is located upstairs in Cunningham's block. Mr. James Cullon, bootmaker, is in the small building formerly used as an office by Dr. Lowe, who kindly gave it up to him; Mr. John Kellett, baker, and Mr. L. Macdonald, watchmaker, have jointly built a small shop under Ingram's Hall; Mr. A. McKillop, bootmaker, has found a refuge under the hospitable roof of Mr. Moffat's store-house; and Mrs. Healey has rented a portion of Mr. J. C. Fitzgerald's building on Colborne street. On Tuesday Mr. Newman bought the old Methodist church at auction for \$100, and is having it moved down to his own lot, where it will be converted into two stores one for himself and the other for Mr. Johnson. Mr. Manning, having determined to retire from mercantile life, has disposed of the whole of his stock—boots and shoes to Mr. Butler, the grocer; to Mr. McFarland, and the clothing to some other person. It is probable that but few of the above named are permanently located but they have wisely acted on the motto, "Any port in a storm," and will stay where they are until more suitable buildings are provided; which, from all we hear will be before long.

NEW BUILDINGS.—Mr. Wm. Jordan has contracted with Mr. Edward Hare for a brick block 40x30 feet on the burnt lands to contain a double store and two single ones; as Mr. Hare built two stores for Mr. Jordan last summer, the natural inference is that his work was satisfactory. The new block will of course be two stories high, and will stand at the corner of Colborne and
