A New Treatment of Tetanus.

The foreign medical journals publish in full the views of Dr. Ria on tetanus. and his new treatment of the same. The disease, he believes, consists essentially of an exaggerated reflex irritability of the spinal cord, which may be indifferently caused by traumatisms, toxic influences, or so-called rheumatic action.
Since the motor tracts of the cord respond in a morbidly exaggerated man-ner to all sensitive impressions, the main object of troatment, he thinks, must be to lessen sensory excitation—the cord, by this means, gaining rest, and thus return to its normal condition being made possible. Dr. Ria, therefore, omphasizes strict isolation of the patients: they are, he says, to be separated from their friends, and kept from all possibility of sensory impressions-even the physician to exercise great care in his intercourse with the patient, less the latter be disturbed.
