News of the Week. Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Leonard Tilley and Hon. Mr. McPherson will probably sail for England on the 24th of May.

The High Bluff, Manitoba, Branch of the Northwest Farmers' Union have passed a resolution favoring secession from the Dominion.

A well-dressed lady fell on the street in Halifax Tuesday in a state of intoxication. She was taken home to a hack by her friends.

Mrs. Albert Copeland, of the township of Minto, Perth, gave birth to triplets Monday morning, two boys and a girl. All doing well.

It is said that Sir Hector Langerin is going to take up his residence in Montreal, and found a newspaper to be consulted in his interests.

South Yarmouth farmers are plowing up their fields of fall wheat, and will sow spring grain in lieu of hazing a doubtful crop of fall grain.

Mr. A. H. Roe, M.P.P., Nanapan, is suffering from an attack of heart disease, from which his physicians have grave doubts of his recovery.

Edward Roberts, Nanapan, has fallen heir to a fortune of \$30,000 through the death of his uncle, Captain Brown, of Windsor, England.

The Fergus waterworks by-law to raise \$6,000 was defeated on Friday last by a majority of 35. A number of ladies exercised their right to the franchise.

Lieutenant-Colonel White, secretary of the Post-office Department, will command the Wimbledon team this year. Captain Bosse goes second in command.

Pope, assistant to Bell, solicitor to the G. T. R., has settled the claims of several Humber disaster sufferers. In some cases more was given than that fixed by the committee, while others got less.

Robert Robertson, grain merchant, Fisherton, Ont., was found drowned in a well behind his grain store-house, Friday morning. It is supposed he accidentally slipped in while getting a drink.

A handsome gold medal, suitably inscribed, has been sent by President Arthur to the Governor General for presentation to Captain Spalding, of Quebec, in recognition of his rescuing the master and crew of an American vessel.

Last Sunday, in Hamilton, a portion of the Salvation Army congregated just outside of the jail and did a service for the benefit of the inmates. The prisoners acknowledged it from behind their bars by waving their handkerchiefs enthusiastically.

A kindergarten department is to be established in connection with the Toronto Normal school next session. During the remainder of the present session Miss Marean, who has charge of the public kindergarten in the city, will deliver a course of lectures to the teachers in training.

A few days ago a very singular case occurred in Dawn, of supposed poisoning by wild parsnip. The victims were three and five years old respectively, and children of Mr. Arthur Dexie. The little sufferers are credited with having had over one hundred convulsions each.

Sexton Panther, of St. Thomas cemetery, dug up a walnut coffin a few days ago, which had been interred for 21 years, and the coffin was not in the least decayed, the corpse appearing perfect, and with the exception of discoloration, the same as when it was interred two decades since.

Mrs. Hodge, of Stanbridge East, Quebec, recently received from the United States government the sum of \$1,890, and a guarantee of nine dollars per month during her life, being pension money due her in consequence of one of her sons being killed in the Union army during the late civil war.

An answer has been received from the authorities at Washington declining to interfere in the case of Luke Phillips, now in Sandwich gaol under sentence of death for murdering his wife. The condemned man has abandoned all hope of escaping the gallows, and is only anxious for the arrival of the fatal day.

W. H. Rowe, a farm hand, arrived in Hamilton recently from Franklin Centre. He was met at the Grand Trunk railway station by a stranger, who procured a room for him at a hotel, and slept with him, but arose before Rowe did and walked off with his valise, containing clothes, a note for \$100 and \$40 in cash.

Mr. A. Bethune, son of Dr. Bethune, of Toronto, and Mr. Geo. Edgington were on board the ill-fated steamer State of Florida. The latter was a young Scotchman, and both were engaged in orange growing in Florida. They were on their way to Glasgow to visit Edgington's father, who is a wealthy merchant there.

Mr. R. D. Gamble, manager of the Dominion Bank at Brampton for the last five years, having been promoted to the agency of the same bank at Nanapan, was called upon at his office by a large number of merchants and business men who presented him with a massive gold watch and chain and seal attached, suitably engraved.

Harry Robinson, a barber and theatrical manager, of Woodstock, was arrested at St. Thomas the other night for the alleged theft of a gold watch. A car load of goods had been bought on "tick" and was seized there en route for Detroit. Robinson's pockets were filled with gold coins when arrested.
