The Bowmansville News says that an individual hailing from Lindsay, paraded the streets with the Salvation Army, on Sunday last, with the inscription "Will You" in large letters across his back. He passed no small amount of amusement for the boys. Soap must be a luxury in that town.

Holders of third class teachers' certificates who desire a renewal or extension of such certificates, are required to present themselves at the non-residential examination on the 3rd day of July 1884, in the county town, otherwise the Master will grant no extension unless under special circumstances, and valid for a year until next examination.

There is no invention spoken of which it is thought may abolish the bit. It is called the carriage or anti-horse torture. It is composed of a steel band placed over the front bone of the horse's nose, and to this appliance the reins are attached. The inventor claims for this substitute for the bit that it gives complete control to the driver over the horse without inflicting the least discomfort or torture on the animal itself. It has been tried with satisfactory results.

A writer in the Canadian Sportsman says he heard the other day of a farmer up the country who took a hay fork swindler by the throat when he came to make his collection and compelled the fellow to sign a discharge receipt in full. If a few more of the scoundrels were served the same way, the world would stand a chance of becoming extinct, and the unscrupulous agriculturist would be saved from a great plague.

A correspondent in a city exchange argues strongly in favor of black walnut forest culture. He says that for rapid growth the chestnut is inferior, and the black walnut is threefold of an inch a year. Now that attention is so generally directed to the necessity of tree-planting, the ultimate value of the trees so planted ought to be considered in selecting them. Walnut is one of the species enumerated under the terms of the Ontario tree planting act for which a bonus is given.

The court of revision sat Tuesday in the council chamber. In the majority of cases the assessments were confirmed, in a few they were slightly reduced. The case of the telegraph and telephone companies appealing against their total assessment resulted in a slight reduction, as also was the case with the railway assessment. In each of these cases however there will be a second appeal and it is probable a change will yet be made in the Midland Railway assessment at all events. The cases of the telegraph and telephone companies is now a question of law as to whether their property in Canada can legally be assessed at all.

The time allowed is as follows: For deaths, immediately; for births, 30 days, and for marriages three months. If convicted of neglect in this matter a magistrate may impose a fine of \$20 and costs.
