THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Now that a local board of health has been organized it is to be hoped there will be no delay in actively carrying out its object.

THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

The Post has renewed its assertions attempting to show that Mr. J. B. Dundas supported the Victoria bonds for \$85,000 although denied so emphatically by that gentleman the week previous.

When the Post stated last week that THE WARDER said local Reformers got the "town to give bonuses for doing which their pockets were well lined" it states what is not true as it well knows.

It is all very well for our contemporary to claim now that the Dominion Government should assume the railway debt of Lindsay because the roads have become the property of the Grand Trunk and consequently under the supervision of the Department of Railways.

Dominion Government either through a change of railway policy or for some other reason cause a public loss to any corporation they invariably give restitution, as they did in the Pembroke case and other instances of a like nature.

The Post can squeal and squirm on this railway question as it may the fact remains that the Ontario Government, the local Reformers and its own mercenary self have been the cause of all the mischief.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

It has been discovered that it is not the army worm that is playing such ravages among the crops in the Ottawa district, but another insect very much resembling that species.

The Dominion Government, in order to guard against the importation of infected cattle into Canada, has appointed an experienced veterinary surgeon at Liverpool to inspect all cattle shipped for Canadian ports.

Our contemporary attempts a feeble drive at Mr. Hector Cameron in last week's issue. Considering the poor success the Post has had in the past in its attacks on Mr. Cameron this waste of good paper and ink is most unwarrantable.

Mr. H. H. Smith, of Peterborough, has been appointed inspector of Dominion land agencies vice Mr. W. Pearee, appointed superintendent of mines, in consequence of the important movement of mining population to the Rocky Mountains.

Our friend Mr. J. Stohart, that valiant Haliburton gentleman who so nobly attempted to "settle" THE WARDER last fall, and registered it "so we should not have the excuse we didn't get it," has been rewarded for his services. He is now a noble bum baillif.

The Post so far forgot itself last week as to express its displeasure at the color of our coat and other little matters of a personal nature. We were not aware that the Post had suddenly become so "soney."

The Regina land agency has been divided into three districts. Mr. J. J. McHugh, of Ottawa, has been appointed to the southern agency; Mr. McTaggart, of North Victoria, to the northern agency; and Mr. W. H. Stephenson, vice Mr. J. Macdonald Gordon, has been promoted to the Calgary district.

Rochester is to have a semi-centennial celebration as well as Toronto. The first house on the present site of Rochester was built in 1810, but it was not until 1864 that the village had become a city of ten thousand inhabitants, and was incorporated.

The letter elsewhere from Mr. J. H. Knight respecting the roads ably deals with the point we desired to show, viz: that the county council is better able to undertake the improvement of main highways where large expenditures are needed at once than township councils are who can only spend a few dollars each year.

At their meeting on Monday evening the council did not see their way clear to pay the \$1000 granted conditionally for sports and fireworks on the 24th May. From the statement published elsewhere this was not to be wondered at.

Mr. Brokenshire has not yet been called on to perform his summer duties in connection with the Rosedale locks, but so long as the salary comes with its accustomed regularity he considers he has no right to complain.

The shuffling, timorous attitude of the Globe towards the important topics touched upon in Sir Richard Cartwright's speech is in striking contrast to the robust virility which, with all its faults, characterized that paper in the regime of the Browns.

Although the frost of last week did considerable damage in gardens in the way of cutting down early stuff, and beans, corn and potatoes as a field crop that had been planted early, it had a salutary effect in checking the development of a number of insect enemies.

The Ontario Government has issued a report of the geographical surveys in northern Ontario. According to this report it is a grand country, with magnificent mines, fishing, and agricultural resources, and the finest water courses on the continent.

Country Roads.

Sir,—In last week's issue I noticed an article on the roads in this county in which it is represented that in general the roads are getting worse.

I do not think it would be any advantage if the county council were to take charge of all the roads instead of the minor municipalities.

But there is one class of work the county council might undertake with advantage, I allude to heavy jobs which are beyond the ordinary resources of the townships.

At present the road is chopped, but the stumps are standing. To remove the stumps, ditches and grade would probably cost \$1,000 and it would take the township council ten years.

It would be very easy to suggest improvements in other parts of the county, but I think it unnecessary at present. J. H. KERR.
