The county council of the provisional county of Haliburton met in the town hall, Minden, on Tuesday, the 17th of June, 1884, at two o'clock p. m. Present:—Wm. Gainer, Esq., reeve of Munden, warden; James Dover, Dysart; Henry Ferrier, Stanhope and Sherbourne; James Mortimer, Anson and Hindon; W. F. Ritchia, Snowden; David Galloway, Lutterworth; Wm. Ogilvie, Cardin; R. S. Grogan, Glamorgan; and R. J. Buchanan, Mommouth. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

WARDEN'S ADDRESS The warden then addressed the council and congratulated the county on its present satisfactory financial condition. He also reported the result or the labers of the deputation appointed at the least session of the county council to the Ontario government with reference to the Victoria railway bonus from this county. Your committee would recommend a careful examination of the county buildings by the council in order to ascertain whether suitable offices cannot be obtained therein for the county officials.
