A painful accident happened to Henry Underhill, a lad of 12 years old living in the township of South. He and his brother had been grinding a cradle sash in a mill on Saturday. On the way back to their work they placed the cradle and sash in front of them on a spring board, the horse shied causing the rig to strike a stone, throwing the lad and cradle out, he falling sideways on the heel of the cradle including a dangerous wound starting at the center of the left ear and extending about the chin beyond the wind pipe leaving the jugular vein and wind pipe exposed to view. The boy was promptly and kindly cared for until the arrival of Dr. McDermott, from Sunderland, who dressed the wound in his usual skillful manner. Three men—one English and two Irish—were tramping to Gravenhurst to seek work on the railway. They got a bottle of liquor at Barris on Sunday. They went into Mr. F. Ball's barn, drank the liquor, lit their pipes, and went to sleep. At about two o'clock Monday morning the Englishman awoke to find the barn in flames. He pulled one of his companions out but the other perished. The rescued man had his coat tail burned off and his whiskers singed. The Englishman gave himself in custody. Mr. Ball's loss was about \$300. This instance of the reckless character of tramps should be a warning to the people of this district, and should make them very watchful of these lone wanderers.
