TOWN COUNCIL.

The regular meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening, but owing to the roughness of the weather scarcely more than a sufficient number were present to form a quorum, though there were questions of some importance to be considered. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

COMMUNICATIONS. A communication was read from Rum-

A communication was read from Rumsay & Co. in reply to one from the clerk regarding the new fire bells recent-purchased but which were both broken. The menufacturers stated their willingness to replace the bells it freight and duty were paid by the town.

Hamilton, per Mr. John McSweyn, asking for the rebate of taxes as per resolution of council on the large addition made to his workshops and the extra number of hands he agreed to employ. The conditions had been feithfully complied with by Mr. Hamilton. The question was referred. The questionwas referred.

From Mr. G. W. Beall, seking exemption from taxes on \$1,000 personal property, owing to the heavy loss he had sustained by the late robbery and the fact of the goods on which he was called onto pay taxes were not in existence and therefore could not in equity be collected. Referred to the finance committee.

Mr. Martin's certificate respecting the lease to Mr. R. Sylvester was read. The new lease was the same as the old with the extended difference in time, etc., but he did not approve of its provisions.

The mayor said that it was the opinion of the solicitors on both sides that he must be authorized by by-law of the council to give him power to sign the lease.

Col. Dencon did not consider it was absolutely necessary as a resolution had been already passed giving the mayor such suthority and that was amply sufficient. Mr. Connolly gave notice after some discussion that he would bring in a by-law for the purpose of signing the new lease. He also thought something should be done to close up the lease between Mr. Bradburn and the town as to the opera-

FINANCE ERPORT. Col. Descon presented the report of the finance report recommending the payment of sundry accounts, which were passed and ordered to be paid. He moved the adontion of the report.

THE POUNDEREPER. Col. Descon stated that there were no returns coming in from the poundkeeper and he thought that the committee should look after the matter. There had more or less money collected he knew and no returns have yet been made. TAX REMISSIONS

Complaint was made that the taxes on lot 2 in the east ward had been duly paid yet it was found it had been sold for taxes. A remission of the amount charged against the land was asked for and on motion was referred to the finance committee to investigate.

ANOTHER LAMP. Mr. Connolly moved, seconded by Mr. Weese, that the town pay for the oil and care of a lamp on the corner of Mill and Kent streets, near to the residence of Mr. E. Wood, it being a dangerous spot at night, as soon as the parties interested place the lamp in position, the post and lamp to be the property of the town.—

FIRE AND WATER. The chairman of the fire and water committee read the report, stating that both fire bells were broken but as they were guaranteed the town would be at no loss for the same. The report also complained of the power of the waterworks, stating that the pumps were out of order and that the pumps were out of order and that something must be done concerning them at as early a date as possible. The chairman said he would accept no further any responsibility regarding the water-works while the council permitted them to remain in their present useless condition. The expenses were creeping up higher each year and the efficiency was lowering continually till soon the whole system will be of no use whatever. He Goods.
