Governor Crosby, of Montana, has made his annual report, in which he touches upon the cattle question. The Montana and Wyoming cattle men are much disappointed at their failure to procure right of way for their export stock through Canada. They protest that there has never been contagious disease amongst the cattle of either territory, and that Canadian papers and officiale have "maligned and outrageously attacked the health of Wyoming and Montana cattle, and all movements on the part of our stockmen toward obtaining a foreign market are bitterly opposed." We do not see any way out of the difficulty, unless Governor Crosby annexes his territory to Canada. his territory to Canada.
