Just past this reasonable time in your life to get entirely content over the municipal elections, don't imagine every one will refuse to support your candidate if either a fool or a knave don't fear that general anarchy or even municipal bankruptcy will ensue if a certain set of men be not elected. But keep cool, attend to your business, treat your neighbors civilly, and honestly endeavor to vote for the men who will best serve the interests of your town or township.

Farmers who have been plagued by the flies coming off wagon wheels are apt to look with favor on the air iron wagon, which has wheels that cannot easily get out of order unless broken outright. It is thought by some farmers that these iron wagons are heavier draught in proportion to weight, as there is no "give" when the wheel strikes an obstruction. It is more probable that this rigidity makes them better for the rider, though this may be objected, as in other wagons, by springs.

The present state of the grain market in the West receives a curious illustration in the fact that the farmers of Nebraska are not permitted to receive any more grain for feed. They have come to the conclusion that it is cheaper to burn corn than to sell it and buy coal. So coal is worth in that state about 22 cents a bushel, and corn does not find a ready sale in the rural markets for more than 12 cents. Experiments have shown that two bushels of corn will produce more warmth than one bushel of coal; and farmers are thus bargaining for the former and saving themselves the trouble of hauling it to market and drawing the coal home again. So long as it is profitable for the farmer to burn corn, and while it gives him the proper degree of warmth, he supposes there is no occasion to regret an obstruction. The same state of things existed some eight or ten years ago.

The Monetary Times has the following in regard to a subject which a great many people do not seem to understand—"If you desire to see that people should understand their liability in receiving papers from the post office, which they sometimes pretend they do not want, and refuse to pay for, but yet read, a case which is of interest to publishers and readers recently came before Judge Doyle in the division court at Windsor. A resident of Huron had been receiving the Canadian Star from its present publisher, and when billed with an account for four years, refused to pay on the ground that he did not want it. The paper had not been discontinued then, and his name still appeared on the subscription list named by the present publisher. The judge held that as the defendant had never so notified the plaintiff, he had still received the paper, he was liable for the four years claimed and gave judgment accordingly in the sum of \$100.

A pleasant, attractive house, clean, roomy, well ventilated and lighted apartments, attractive maps or pictures upon the walls, with teachers personally neat, well dressed, dignified, and gentlemanly, are greatly helpful to success in teaching.

The Canadian Land & Emigration company, a British corporation which owns a large tract of land in Haliburton, has an action now in course of trial before Mr. Justice Ferguson to restrain the township of Dysart and its township council, &c., from assessing the company's lands in the township at a higher value than \$80,000. It appears that the township assessor placed the lands at \$150,000, and the court of revision on the company appealing not only affirmed the assessment but increased it to \$250,000. This action was accordingly brought and the trial was begun on Monday afternoon, Mr. S. H. Blake, Q. C., Mr. Walter Cassels, Q. C., and Mr. O. T. Blackstock appearing for the company, and Mr. Dalton McCarthy, Q. C., and Mr. Hudspeth, Q. C., of Lindsay, for the township. Mr. McCarthy closed by way of demurrer or preliminary objection the question of the company's right to bring what is in effect an appeal from the court of revision, when by statute an appeal exclusively lies to the stipendiary magistrate of Haliburton. This point was debated for four hours before the learned judge, who then reserved his decision. A large number of witnesses from Dysart are in attendance, and if the case should be allowed to proceed the trial will in all probability be a long one.

COUNTY COURT.

The following is a list of the most important cases at the county court last week. There were besides this criminal cases in two of which there was a conviction.

MOLAN V. McLEAN.—Action against administrator for money left and goods sold to intestate. A settlement was agreed upon before the case was tried, plaintiff getting \$55 and each party paying his own costs. Hudspeth & Jackson for plaintiff, McIntyre & Stewart for defendant.

JONES V. STEPHENSON.—Action to register agreement for sale of land by the defendant to the plaintiff and her husband, of a lot in Onanee, and to recover back the amount paid on account of the consideration. Defendant denied that he had agreed to cancel the agreement. After hearing the evidence the judge withdrew case from the jury and gave judgment in favor of the defendant. F. D. Moore for plaintiff, Hudspeth & Jackson for defendant.

PATERSON V. FRANKS.—The plaintiff in this case is a manufacturer of agricultural implements at Patterson, Ontario, and the action was brought by them to recover the price of a time binder reaping machine sold by them to the defendant, a farmer living in the township of Emily. The defendant alleged that the machine was totally useless to him and gave evidence to show that it was continually getting out of gear. Plaintiff contended that defendant was bound by his contract to accept the machine, and that the machine was not defective. Defendant asserted that this machine was not used by him and that he did not know of the conditions mentioned in it. After considering the matter for a long time the judge gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff. O'Leary & O'Leary for plaintiff, Hudspeth & Jackson for defendant.
