DYSART. ndence of The Warder.

Company v. Dysart suit, which affects the interests not only of the municipality of Dysart, but also of the entre provision. al county of Haliburton, came on for hearing before Mr. Justice Ferguson, in the chancery division for the hearing of trials at Osgoode Hall, on the 15th inst.
Mr. S. Blake in opening the case for the plaintiffs, claimed that their assessment in 1883 being \$111,000, it is wrongfully and fraudulently raised in 1884 to \$243,the defendants, contended that the court had no jurisdiction—that relief should have been sought by appeal to the stipendary magistrate, as provided by statute, contending that the ordinary method of obtaining such should be first sought before adopting an extraordinary method. Mr. McCarthy went on to say that there being three ways of vacating judgment, by prohibition ; by appeal ; or if there be no appeal, by certiorari; then prohibition striking at the jurisdiction of the court, if at the sitting of the court of revision it had been claimed that fraud caused error of judgment, the plaintiffs might have proceeded by prohibition, but that sentence being complete, prohibition cannot be applied for, and further that it is held that if a judge of an inferior court have an interest in the case at issue, even although the proceedings of that court be regular you can proceed by certiorari. It was further contended by Mr. McCarthy that F. Dover, the appellant to the court of revision against the plaintiff's assessment, should have been represented inthe suit, because the corporation having no interest in the appellant as against the plaintiffs, that interest is general and not individual, and the appellant may be prejudiced in his absence; and finally that the court cannot interfere because the sixty-nine appellants to the court of revision whose assessment were revised by that court, might be prejudicially affected by the action of his lordship's court without opportunity for obtaining redress. Mr. Blake in reply, relied upon the incentrovertible axiom that fraudvitiates everything, contending that fraud avoids judgment, and that the arm of the law is long enough to reach fraud wherever it may exist.
