He taken for extra job without payment, but when the needed attention is overlooked or forgotten, the remedy is to keep a list of every thing which ought to be done, and which may be performed without great difficulty. A very small memorandum book with still covers, which may be carried in the pocket, will enable the owner to set down on the spot everything which needs attention. A postal card folded double will answer, or a piece of pasteboard half the size of the hand, the entries in which may be transferred to a more permanent book every few days. As examples of such entries, at this time of year, take the following, which the owner may keep near whenever he has a spare half day, or even an hour:

1. Repair the board fence next the pasture.
2. Get new hinges for two of the farm gates.
3. Stiffen gate posts so that they may open and shut easily.
4. Mow the Canada thistles, along the fences, just going to seed.
5. Cut the dead limbs on the fruit trees.
6. Pull up the neglected pig weeds in the potatoes.
7. Cut back the old shubbery.
8. Oil and black the buggy harness.
9. Give the last mowing or cutting of Prairie green to the potatoe bugs.
10. Give a liberal coating of crude petroleum to all out-door wood work which is worth saving.
11. Collect a few barrels of road dust for vaults and for saving bee manure.
12. See that all tools for preparing the ground for fall-seeding are in the best condition.

The farmer who minutes down on the spot every needed job, will soon have a list like the preceding, which he can augment and improve, and be ready to carry out whenever there is a vacant time. At the present juncture, when harvesting and haying may be completed, many items of work may be performed, by continuing the onward course of years, the owner will enjoy the satisfaction of neat and finished premises. A large portion of our readers have already adopted this or a similar course with much success.
