Bradburn's Opera House.

"It never rains but it pours" has this week levelled the Opera. On Monday and Tuesday evening John S. Lindsay's Criterion Dramatic Company occupied the stage, and on Wednesday and Thursday Messrs. "Silver King" Co.

DAVE CROCKETT.

Monday evening the western romantic drama, "Dave Crockett," was presented to a fair sized house. The spirit of this drama was not Canadian, but it was well acted. Mr. Lindsay, who has a continental reputation, both as Shakespearean and lighter dramatic actor, appeared to advantage as Dave Crockett. Messrs. Ralph Appleby, Harry Harvey acted their respective parts with merit, while Miss Fanny Bernard made a most excellent heroine. Mrs. Harvey, too, was a good Mrs. Crockett, while Mr. Clarke was a most graceful Lo Harbo.

But the Company appeared to much better advantage on Tuesday evening in "CAT ON THE HAT."

The reason of this is, not that the company was in fact, but the plot and general plan of the play are more in keeping with Canadian tastes. While "Dave Crockett" represents a wild western life in the mountains, "Cat on the Hat," deals with English scenes and people.

Here, again, Mr. John S. Lindsay came to the front as the old man "Squib Heath," and the part was most successfully acted. As "Frank Lawson," the young nobleman, Mr. Ralph D. Ryan, performed his many and varied pieces well; he neither over, nor under, did nature. Mr. Harry Harvey was much better as "Shamplin" than he was in his role of the previous evening, being just about right. Harry Miller made a most excellent Deputy Miss Fanny Bernard, as Mabel Heath, was not an extraordinary beauty, but her wit and her character were dazzling; but it is in her performance, we submit, that her acting in "Cat on the Hat" was the most natural and therefore the best we have seen in that play. The stage etiquette and training requires everything overdone. That is a mistake and Miss Bernard rectified it. We do not know how long she has been before the footlights; but in such parts as we have seen her play she has few equals. The fact that she is not a coquette adds to her success. Miss Alice Spencer, too, was a good, quiet, natural "Satie Milton."

We felt sorry that owing to wet weather the "Silver King's" fancy balls and other dances, the Criterion Co. had small houses. It was simply a shame to see talent and training such as Messrs. Lindsay, Dorman, Clarke and Harvey, and Miss Bernard displayed, thrown away on such a small house. Mr. Lindsay would make a magnificent Harry V. or in fact from his occasional powers, seems fit for any of Shakespeare's parts. We bespeak for the company a better house next time.

Decision of the Privy Council.
